Jim Pointexter returned last Saturday from a visit with relatives and friends in the Willamette valley.

The Condon school district voted a \$1000 tax for school purposes on Saturday.

F. B. Golden was over from Mayville yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Moore's baby has been dangerously ill for several days with convulsions. Mrs. Moore is also ill with la grippe.

Elder Chase of the denomination of Latter Day Saints, who was preaching and debating here last week, closed his meetings Sunday evening. He is a fluent and entertaining speaker.

Editor Stewart and Atty Hendricks, of Fossil, went north on the stage yesterday through the blinding blizzard presumably en route to Salem. Wonder if there is another "coyote bill" coming up.

Mrs. Al Henshaw lost her entire collection of house plants by the sudden cold snap Tuesday night. Her's was one of the very finest collections in the county and her chagrin at losing them was great.

A class in elocution has been formed here under the tutelage of the Johnson Bros., of Salt Lake City. These gentlemen are thorough in their instruction and much interest is being shown by the class.

W. J. Edwards and E. A. These gentlemen are residents of the section which it is proposed to cut off, and they represent a large majority of the people of their precinct.

The Wheeler County Bill.

On Thursday of last week, after a rather stormy career in the committee room, House Bill No. 133, providing for the creation of Wheeler county from portions of Grant, Crook and Gilliam, was called up, under a special order of business, by Representative Hawson, of this county, and was defeated by one vote.

The bill was brought up for reconsideration by Mr. Knight, of Clackamas county, who, when it came up for final passage, stated that he had been induced to move a reconsideration by a promise that certain changes would be made in the bill, but as no changes were made he would again vote against it.

This vote was then taken and the bill was passed in the house.

It remains to be seen what action the senate will take on the measure, but the latest reports from Salem are encouraging that the bill will be defeated.

Senator Dufur, who will lead the opposition in the senate, is said to have letters in his possession from citizens of the south end of the proposed Wheeler county, which show up the whole business in rather a bad light for the promoters of the bill.

The people of that section are up in arms against including any portion of Gilliam in the new county and Senator Dufur will ventilate the entire scheme on the floor of the senate, when the proper time arrives, and will make a hard fight against a measure that has been gotten up for the benefit of a few against the wishes of the many.

Mr. Hawson made a valiant fight against this measure which proposed to cut in twain the county he so ably represents, and to his influence was largely due the credit of defeating the bill in the first vote in the house. He never quit fighting, until finally overwhelmed by point of numbers.

Artisan Well Bill Passed the House.

The following telegram was received at this office yesterday afternoon:

"STATE HOUSE, Salem, Or., Jan. 31, '99. TO CONDON GLOBE, Condon, Or."

House Bill No. 1 passed house tonight. S. G. Hawson."

This bill appropriates \$3,000 to each county in Eastern Oregon to assist in prospecting for artesian water.

How He Stands.

We publish it this week, however, in order to show the people of Gilliam county our representative's position on the division question from his own standpoint:

To THE EDITOR:—

I am in receipt of several communications in reference to the county division. I take this means of letting my constituents in Gilliam county know the position I am assuming on this question.

I feel that it is my duty that I should use all honest means to defeat this bill, which provides for the new county of Wheeler, cutting off a portion of Gilliam.

I am actuated in this matter solely on the spirit of conservatism, and trust that my attitude will prove satisfactory to the people whom I represent. I cannot please all of my constituents. I can only try to do what I think my conscience dictates is right. I am,

Mr. Hawson, not the Measure, is Popular Here.

Mr. Hawson, of Gilliam county, made a fight very creditable to himself, on the floor of the house yesterday. In opposition to the new county of Wheeler, he had a difficult piece of work on hand and he did well. The measure is a popular one and there was widespread recognition that the new county is needed, but Mr. Hawson succeeded in blocking the passage of the bill. It remains to be seen whether one of the negatives can be persuaded to move a reconsideration, which would be dangerous to Mr. Hawson's desire—Salem Statesman.

Tank Completed.

The huge tank of the city water works system has been completed and connection made with the well. The windmill was turned loose on Monday and the first water was pumped into the tank.

The tank is supported on 16 iron columns, 16 feet high, which in turn rest on pillars of masonry built from solid formation. The tank itself is 16 feet deep and 25 feet in diameter, and holds about 53,000 gallons. The entire structure is enclosed in a stoutly constructed and well-finished frame building 23 feet square and about 40 feet high. The work of laying the masonry has been commenced and the entire system may be expected to be completed by early spring.
