Land Deeded in Past Year.

Assessor Clarke has finished the work of adding the newly deeded land to his roll and has handed us the following figures: Homesteads deeded in past year, 6,777 acres; timber culture, 6,013 acres; cash entries, 15,825 acres, making a total of 28,615 acres deeded in old Gilliam county during the past 12 months. Of this amount but 4,925 acres lie in that portion of the old county which now belongs to Wheeler county. Watch Gilliam county grow.
