Walla Tonaka is a famous baseball player among his tribe, and his first death sentence was postponed in order to give him a chance to fulfill an engagement with his team for a tour of the western states. He is doubtless the only man who ever starred the country as a ball player while under sentence of death, and he is the only race who habitually turn their condemned loose and depend on their pride in the tribal honor for their appearance on the day set for execution. It is said that in the Choctaw tribe this tradition has never been violated, and Walla Tonaka has three times proven that he had rather die than be the first to violate it.

District Attorney's Salary.
State Senator John Michell, of The Dalles, was at the capitol yesterday and looked up the status of the act regulating the salaries of district attorneys. He was much chagrined to find that the district attorney for the seventh judicial district, under the new law, would receive only \$3,000 per annum. Senator Michell said that he had requested his colleague, Senator E. B. Dufur, to offer an amendment to the bill, when it came up for consideration in the senate, changing the compensation for the seventh district from \$3,000 to \$3,500, and he now discovered that the change had not been made, nor do the officers of the senate recall the proposal of such an amendment, neither does the record show that Senator Dufur, or any other member, offered an amendment in this connection. Senator Michell's chagrin, at the failure of his proposed amendment, the fate of which he was compelled to entrust to his colleague, being unavoidably absent himself when the bill came up for consideration, is explained by those who are informed, to be due to the fact that the seventh district prosecuting attorney is the senator's law partner.

The blame is not placed upon the officers of the senate, for it is evident that the desired amendment was not made, as the two clerks have a complete record of the transactions of the senate on that measure, both made at the time, and neither record shows the offering of an amendment to the bill, changing the salary of the seventh district—Salem Statesman.
