The people of Fossil seem to be hunters. They held a mass meeting last week and decided to have a depot and station agent at their town, also to build a road and a telephone line to Condon. Condon will be strictly in it some of these days if the plans of our neighbors don't miscarry.

F. T. Harburt, cashier of the First National Bank, of Arlington, and R. B. Miller, Assistant General Freight Agent of the O. R. & N. Co., were in this vicinity last week taking a look at the wonderful resources of Gilliam county as a wheat growing section. It is understood that the object of the gentlemen's visit was to determine, approximately, the amount of freight tonnage this county will furnish, the present season, with a view to securing a better freight rate from Arlington. The gentlemen left here Sunday morning for Moro, in company with T. G. Johnson, of this place.

The well drill belonging to Palmer & White which is at work at Cooke's place east of town is temporarily tied up. The drill was put to work in the bottom of a 50 foot well and after sinking about 30 feet it became fastened so tightly in the hole that it could not be moved with the machinery. Some blasting will probably have to be done before the drill can be recovered.

William G. Frank Edwards Wounded.

The list of casualties occurring among the American forces in the Philippines during the recent engagement, as published in the Portland Telegram, contains the name of Corporal Frank E. Edwards, of Company M, Second Oregon, who was severely wounded in the thigh. He is a son of W. J. Edwards, of Mayville, and left a position in the O. A. C. at Corvallis to enlist.

Later—Tuesday's Oregonian contains the following:

"No Edwards in M company; may be Fred E. Edwards, a corporal in company L. The latter is a Portland boy and is well known in the city. He was a member of company K, O. N. G., having enlisted in that organization in June '95."

Telephone Rumors.

M. O. Clarke spent a part of last week in the Lone Rock country on business. He says the new telephone line between Lone Rock and Heppner is working fine and the people of the former place are anxious to have the line extended to Condon. The Company do not ask any bonus from the people, other than the purchase of a stated amount of coupons, which can be used afterwards for payment of service over the line. This would seem to be the easiest way for Condon to secure telephone communication with the outside world and we hope to see our people take hold of the proposition and make it go.

Since the above was put in type a letter has been received from the Blue Mountain Telephone Co., which states that this territory is looked upon by them as belonging to the Inland Telephone Co. and that they expect the Inland to build a line from Arlington to Condon and Fossil this summer without any bonus from the people. If such is the case the B. M. T. Co. will not build here, otherwise they may.

A line direct to Arlington would suit Condon better than any other but the general opinion here is that we must have a telephone.

Boats and Portage Roads.

Since the government is showing little activity in the matter of removing obstructions to navigation of the Columbia above The Dalles, and neither Oregon nor Washington has taken the matter up as a state enterprise, it rests with private individuals to accomplish this end if it is done at all. That the work will be done as a private enterprise seems likely, a company having been organized for that purpose, and sufficient capital has been secured to carry the plan into execution. Dr. Blacklock, of Walla Walla, one of the movers in the matter, has given out the following statement concerning what is proposed to be done.

"The incorporators of the new company are N. G. Blacklock, of Walla Walla; W. J. Mariner, of Gilliam county, and J. Smith, of Blaine, and the capitalization is to be \$1,000,000. Regarding the financial features of the enterprise, I will say only this, that the money to construct the rail lines and to build and equip the boats comes through the Russell Sage interests. A gentleman who acts as Russell Sage's attorney in New York, an old associate and acquaintance of mine, was the one through whom I enlisted Mr. Sage in the plan, and, of course, it need not be said that with such backing the supply of sufficient funds is beyond question."

"We propose to put on a line of boats on the Columbia river, to ply between Astoria, Portland and the foot of the rapids of the Columbia, construct a portage railway to transport freight around the rapids, and have also a boat line to ply from the rapids to points farther up, at least as far as Umatilla."

"All along the Columbia river are various places, which, if they could be reached from the river, would pour into the coast ports a steady stream of agricultural and livestock products, in much larger volume than they now do. We propose, therefore, to build spur rail lines from the river to Pendleton, Walla Walla, Heppner, Condon and other points, to connect with the boat lines, and to serve as feeders."

"We have been assured by competent railway men that this scheme is feasible, and that, once under operation, it can not fail to be a paying proposition."

"The main advantage in the plan is that it gives us water transportation to the seaboard, except for the small distance on the spur rail lines, and then, too, it brings all the Columbia river inland to direct communication with the markets of the seaboard. Any one will at once recognize this as an ideal transportation project, and the scheme is bound to be a success from the start."

"The headquarters of the new company will be in Walla Walla, and the corporation is organized under the laws of the state of Washington."—Times-Herald.
