He says there is a grand rush for the public land in the counties of Morrow, Gilliam, Wasco, Wheeler and Grant, and that there are millions of acres of good tillable land yet awaiting entry. Homestead entries are now being made at the rate of about 70 a month, and many tracts once abandoned are now being filed on.—Telegram.

A Greater Olex. The traveling correspondent of the East Oregonian writes in his paper as follows: "At Olex I found the people much interested in a move that is being made by several different parties to secure the Olex property which is located a half mile below town. It is rumored and generally believed, that L. O. Ralston, who recently sold out his stock of general merchandise at Olex to Tobey Bros., is making an effort to secure this piece of property, with a view of resuming business in Gilliam county. There are others, however, who seem to consider this property a desirable location, for an effort was being made by Grant, Sherman and Fremont Wade, all well known young men of Gilliam county, to purchase the Olex estate. When I passed through Arlington last Wednesday, I was told on good authority that if they succeeded in buying the land, their intention was to lay out a new town. It is asserted that the Wade brothers are based in this enterprise by their brother R. M. Wade, the well known implement dealer of Portland, and that if they made the deal, they will at once put the flouring mill, which is a part of the deal, in operation. Besides this, they will start a general merchandise store; these in conjunction with a good blacksmith shop and possibly a post office, will form the nucleus for the new town. If this scheme is effected, however, it will not, by any means, be a walk away for the new store-keepers, as W. L. Tobey has, since locating at Olex, been so fair in his dealings with the people of Rock creek and vicinity, that they will have to have some very flattering inducements before they will draw their patronage from him."
