Serious Runaway Accident.
A serious runaway occurred last Sunday on the Arlington road about two miles below Clem in which E. P. Weir, of Arlington, was severely injured. Mr. Weir, Judge Bradshaw, W. H. Wilson and H. S. Wilson of The Dalles, were on their way to this place to attend circuit court, traveling in a two seated hack, when at the point where the accident occurred, they overlooked the stage and in attempting to pass it while coming down a steep grade one of the hack wheels gave way and the occupants were thrown out.

Mr. Weir was thrown violently to the ground alighting on his head and shoulders, suffering a fracture of the collar bone and two or three ribs. The injured man was brought on to C. A. Dannehan's place at Clem where he was made as comfortable as possible, pending the arrival of Dr. Hudson who was summoned from here. The doctor reduced the fractures and left the patient resting as comfortably as could be expected. It will probably be ten days or two weeks before he can be moved to his home. The team ran to Clem where they brought up in a ditch and the hack was almost completely demolished.
