

OREGONIAN INJUSTICE.

About the recent outrage at Wardner, Idaho, committed by members of the miners' union against the Banker Hill & Sullivan Mining Company, the Oregonian indulges in unjust criticism of the state and the state government.

"How long will the state of Idaho be content with a state government that is not equal to affording the slightest protection to mining mill owners in the preservation of their property? The mining industry was closed out by the violence of the strikes of 1892 and now it has been blown up. How a young state like Idaho can be so foolish as to put up with a state government that cannot protect property, whose preservation is of importance to the growth of the state, is beyond all understanding. No man can afford to invest large capital in Idaho, where it is not only without any protection from riot but where populist public opinion would not permit mine owners to protect themselves."

The facts are that Governor Steunenberg, and other state officials, have done all in their power to quell the riot and to maintain order in Shoshone county, but that county being under full control of the miners' union and being remote from the state capital, the real facts were perhaps withheld from the governor for a time, but as soon as he learned that the county officials were unable or unwilling to preserve order, he lost no time in calling on the president for federal troops.

It is true that the state was not able to handle the situation without the aid of federal troops, but the Oregonian should know, if it does not, that the reason was not the fault of the state officers but because every available man in the Idaho National Guard, enlisted in the volunteer army a year ago and is now in the Philippines fighting the battles of his country.

Idaho is a grand young state and the Oregonian has no right to thus attempt to snitch the fair name of her people, who, outside of Shoshone county are as law abiding and loyal as any people on earth. Shoshone county undoubtedly contains an element of citizens who are a disgrace to the state, but the vigorous measures now being taken by the authorities bids fair to rid the county and state of their presence, and when that is accomplished human life and property will be as safe in any part of Idaho as it is to day in Portland within the shadow of the Oregonian building.
