J. W. Blake has sold his residence property, on south Main street to F. M. Pitter, the consideration being \$750.

W. L. Wilcox brought his family home from Pine creek last Saturday where they visited friends for a week or so.

Dan Rinehart is having a well sunk on his Church street property. Palmer & White's well machine is doing the drilling.

Miss Beulah Fitzwater went out to her father's sheep ranch, on the John Day, Saturday, where she will spend the summer.

Wheat is again rolling towards Arlington in car-load lots. It takes a long time to market an ordinary Gilliam county wheat crop.

Will Thompson, Cant Zachary, Coe Barnard, Will Hoover and other Wheeler county cattlemen, stopped over night here Friday on their way to Arlington with a drive of cattle to be delivered to Mr. Reynolds.

Since last week the sheep shearing record has again been broken, this time by August Seckamp. At Darling's corral the other day, August sheared 156 sheep in 9 1/2 hours, actual shearing. At the same corral Billie Farrar made a record of 615 sheep in six days which is hard to beat.

J. W. Blake started from Lost Valley yesterday with 13,000 head of sheep which he will trail to Wyoming. Mr. Blake has bought about 19,000 head this season having sold 6,000 head to Mr. Foster who will also trail to Wyoming. Doc Wilson, the Douglas sheepman, has started 18,000 head from Heppner this season for the same destination.

Miss Birdie Henshaw entertained a few friends at her pleasant home, on Thursday evening of last week, the feature of the evening being vocal and instrumental music. Miss Henshaw is one of most gifted young musicians of Eastern Oregon and her vocal solos and instrumental music were highly appreciated on that occasion. Deputy Sheriff Pinkham visited Arlington the first of the week on official business.

A crew of sheep shearers made things lively in town Tuesday, having taken a lay off on account of the rain.

A report from Lost Valley yesterday, stated that five inches of snow had fallen there the previous night.

Josh Portwood expects to go to Wyoming about June 1st, with Barker's sheep. They will ship from Heppner.

W. N. Brown has returned from a cattle buying trip through Grant county where he bought about 2000 head of cattle.

Wm. Musgrove has gone across the John Day river where he expects to engage in hauling wool to The Dalles until July.

The death roll of the Oregon volunteers in the Philippines, numbers 53. Of these 39 died of disease and 14 were killed in battle.

Victor Palmer, the young son of Randle Palmer, is carrying a broken collar bone around with him this week, as the result of a tussle he had with an empty barrel the other day.

J. K. Fitzwater will ship his entire band of sheep to Wyoming about the first of next month. S. B. and Louis Barker will ship 3,000 head about the same time. This is done on account of the difficulty experienced in getting sheep to and from the summer range in this country.

The story is told on a certain Wheeler county justice-of-the-peace that upon a man being brought before him on a criminal charge, he tried him, found him guilty and then sent him to Fossil to be "bound over." Perhaps he thought the "binding" over at Fossil, was a literal process done with raw-hide rope or back-kick thongs.

A wreck on the S. P. railroad, near Roseburg, a few days ago resulted in the death of the engineer, James McCalley and an unknown tramp. The coroner's jury empaneled to investigate the matter, found that the accident was the result of criminal carelessness on the part of the company in running a heavy engine over a light track of worn out rails.

We are informed that Charlie Clarno's steam launch "John Day Queen" was really sunk during the recent high-water on the John Day river, and that the engine and boiler have been covered by the sand which washed over them. This is a serious set back to navigation on the John Day, the Queen being the only vessel which made the ports along the stream.—Antelope Herald.

We acknowledge receipt of an invitation to attend the graduating exercises of the Fossil public school, which event will take place tomorrow, the 19th inst. Misses Gedola Birdie Kennedy and Lillie Dora Kyllonen comprise the class. This is the first annual commencement of the Fossil school and marks an era in the history of education in that town of which the people have occasion to feel proud.

The marshal made quite a "clean-up" in the hobo line yesterday afternoon. Two excellent specimens of the fraternity were lodged in the "cooler," and it is to be hoped they will be given their walking papers when turned loose. The little one was game to the core, in the moment of adversity, but the big fellow lost his nerve and threw himself down and wept bitterly when he failed to touch the marshal's stony heart with his tale of woe.

Some much needed improvements will be made at the public school before the beginning of another term. It is probable that the partition between the two rooms will be moved a few feet south to give more room in the primary department. The "little shavers" were so closely packed last term, that there was hardly room enough for their minds to expand in, to say nothing of physical comfort. The rooms will both be painted and some repairs made on the underpinning of the building.

Keep Off the Grass.

Local cattlemen and sheepmen have pooled together and secured title to sufficient Government land in this part of Grant county since last spring, that will effectively prevent outside sheep from following their last year's trail without trespassing. The trouble experienced by outside sheep in the Middle and North Fork country caused over 100,000 to change their trail to the summit of the mountain south of Long Creek.

The county court has authorized H. A. Murphy of Monument, to continue to act as the county's agent in collecting toll from sheep crossing the North Fork bridge at that place. Land has been entered and purchased in the Deer creek country and it is impossible for them to pass through that locality without serious difficulty. J. A. Steach has purchased land on the summit of the mountain along the Round Basin road which connects the deeded land in Round Basin with that of Fox valley. Land has been entered all along the Long creek mountain in this vicinity that will prevent them reaching the summit without trespassing on rights of others. In order for outside sheep to reach the Greenhorn range, they will be compelled to come by trail north of the North Fork river in Umattila, or follow the public highway for days and days should they attempt to pass through this section of Grant county.

Local cattlemen and sheepmen realize that in order to secure ample range for their bands, it will be necessary for them to work harmoniously together. This they have done thus far, and many former trails will not be powdered into dust this season by outside sheep.—Long Creek Eagle.
