Squire Wilkinson White, of Trail Fork, was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Stephenson for a few days the first of the week. He has almost entirely recovered from the effects of his fall last winter although his left arm is still a little stiff.

The Prineville Journal is authority for the statement that the cause of so much alfalfa being killed out this spring is not the hard winter, as many suppose, but a small white worm about half an inch long with a brownish head. The worm attacks the plant just below the surface of the ground and eats out the heart of the root to a depth of 8 or 10 inches.

A. H. Withrow through his attorney - Leeds, of Portland, has brought suit against the city of Arlington for \$7,500 for false imprisonment and \$800 damages. The case grew out of the enforcement of a city ordinance authorizing the collection of a license, by the city from peddlers vendors etc. Withrow refused to pay the license and was arrested and put in jail. The case will be watched with much interest by other incorporated towns in the state that have adopted similar ordinances.

Mr. Johnson has inspected 103, 200 head of sheep belonging in Gilliam county this spring.

Lodged in Jail. Marshal J. A. Pound, of Arlington, brought Jos Matney out from that city Sunday and lodged him in the county jail to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of lewd co-habitation. The woman in the case was an unfortunate female resident of Arlington's "tenderloin" district who disappeared very mysteriously a few days ago and is supposed to have drowned herself in the Columbia. Another woman of the same quarter, attempted suicide by shooting herself last Friday night, the ball passing just below the heart. She is in a precarious condition.

Railroad Rumors. W. J. Mariner and J. A. Smith, of Blalock, N. G. Blalock, of Walla Walla, and S. McCabe, an eastern railroad man, were in town last Friday night having driven through from Pendleton by private conveyance. The gentlemen were not very communicative as to the object of their trip, but it is understood here that they are looking into the pros and cons of a railroad proposition, the object of which will be to tap Condon, and thence west belt adjacent thereto. If built, the road will be a part of the proposed boat line and portage railway system of transportation on the Columbia river, and will be one of the most important feeders of that system. There appears to be a good prospect that the transportation question, for this section of Gilliam county, is getting in good shape for a speedy solution.

Telephone a Sure Go. We understand the Inland Telephone Co., has at last decided to build a line from Arlington to Condon and work will begin within the next 30 days. There has been so many hitches and delays in this telephone business in the last few years that the people will feel more assurance of having a line after work has actually commenced, but we all hope that the report is well founded. It is likely the line will be continued from this place to Fossil during the summer.

Since the above was put in type Mayor Dunn informs us that a letter has been received from C. B. Hopkins, general manager of the Inland Telephone Co., notifying the city council that work will commence on the line as soon as a franchise is granted by the city of Condon, permitting the building of a line within the incorporation. The letter states that the line will be continued to Fossil during the summer.
