A Big Wool Sale

S. B. Barker has just sold the biggest lot of wool ever sold by one individual in Gilliam county. The lot included two clips of Mr. Barker's wool besides a clip or two that he had bought from other parties and aggregated 700 sacks or about 275,000 pounds. The price received was 10 1/2 cents. The wool was bought for Moses Broa, of Boston and San Francisco.

Condon 32, Fossil 15.

The second game between the Condon and Fossil ball teams was played last Sunday on the Fossil diamond and resulted in a victory for Condon, by a score of more than two to one. Condon people were confident that their team would win the game but they were not prepared to see such a walk over, as they expected to see the Fossil boys do better work on their own grounds than they did here a week earlier.

After the second inning was played it was evident that the game was to be one sided and towards the last spectators and players seemed to lose interest in it and to realize that the only difference a continuation of the game could make, would be on the score card, any change in general results being out of the question. The Fossil boys did their best and were fairly beaten and they took their medicine like little men. There was no dispute and no hard feelings after the game, and every thing went off as pleasantly as could be desired.

Following is the official score of the game.

Condon—Miller, 4; King, 6; Drager, 4; White, 3; McKeown, 3; McCully, 2; Morris, 3; Wells, 5; Junkins, 2; Total 32. 2 whitewash.

Fossil—Dean, 4; Crosson, 2; Steers, 1; Robbins, 1; G. Morris, 2; Stokes, 1; Hamilton, 1; Morris, 2; Hoover, 2; Total 15. 5 whitewash.

Miller and Morris made a hard combination to buck against, and McKeown is, without doubt, the star fielder of the two counties. King and Wells made 6 and 5 tallies, respectively, and as captain of the Condon team Drager proved himself to be the right man in the right place. Umpire Van Houten gave universal satisfaction by his impartial decisions and won the respect and admiration of everybody. We don't know whether or not another game will be arranged for.

Foul Play Suspected.

The alleged mystery connected with the sudden disappearance of one of the residents of Arlington's "tenderloin" district some time ago seems to be cleared up. The following dispatch from Stevenson, Washington, was published in the Oregonian on the 14th inst. "Nicholas Gregorius discovered the body of an unknown woman floating in the Columbia river, near Sprague landing, Sunday. The body bears evidence of foul play. The face had been beaten fearfully, and arms were bruised. There was little clothing on the body. In one stocking was a half pint flask of whiskey. On the middle finger of the right hand was a gold ring, with blue setting. The woman had dark hair about eight inches long. She was about 25 years old. The body had been in the water several days. J. M. Center, justice-of-the-peace, held an inquest, but nothing was brought out as to the identity of the drowned person."

Parties from Arlington went down and identified the body and as there seemed to be some doubt as to the manner of the woman's death, a complaint was made against her former paramour, Joe Matney, charging him with murder, and the warrant for his arrest was sent to Sheriff Wilcox on Friday. Matney had just been released from jail on bail, a few days before, but was still in town, and promptly on receiving the warrant, the sheriff took him in custody and locked him up. Matney was taken to Arlington on Sunday and given a preliminary hearing on Monday, which resulted in the dismissal of the case, it appearing that there was not sufficient evidence upon which to hold the accused.

District Attorney Jayus, of The Dalles, appeared for the state, and Sam E. Van Vactor, of this place, for the defendant.
