HEAVY BANK CLEARINGS.

Were Nearly Fifty Per Cent Larger Than a Year Ago.

R. G. Dun & Company, in their weekly review of trade, say: There is certainly no for some decrease, when the volume of payments through the clearing-house, in July, is 47.3 per cent larger than last year, the best of all previous years. So great an advance would warrant expectation of some setback under ordinary circumstances. This year, the unusual freedom from labor troubles, about July 1, is followed by some signs of a tendency to strike, because great works are committed far ahead and cannot halt without loss. But interruption of business by labor troubles of all sorts has been less than in any other July for years. Nor is the movement of products hampered. Western receipts of wheat in July have been 18,863,828 bushels, against 7,309,333 bushels last year to date, and corn, 20,485,431 bushels, against 9,175,353 bushels last year, even the latest week showing large gains over last year. Exports of wheat, from both coasts, were 9,839,380 bushels, flour included, against 8,833,192 bushels last year. Copper is strong, with spot scarce and lead weak at \$4.55, but tin is quoted at \$31.55, London leading as usual.

Shipments of boots and shoes from the East, in four weeks, have been 394,374 cases, against 360,535 last year; and in 1895, the nearest previous year, 351,359 cases. Leather continues strong and scarce, with a combination of packers lifting prices of hides at Chicago, so that many of the takers are quitting that market.

Failures for the week have been 151 in the United States, against 225 last year, and 20 in Canada, against 26 last year.

IN AND ABOUT A MINE.

Blind Lode—One that shows no surface croppings. Placer—Alluvial deposits; earth containing gold dust. Foot Wall—The lower wall or side of a lode or vein. Cap-rock—The formation overlying the pay dirt or ore. Wall—Boundary of vein, lode or ledge and inclosing the same. Breasting—Taking ore from the face of a mine or head of a drift. Adit—A tunnel or vein or lode—a passage for water underground. Shaft—A vertical or incline excavation for prospecting or working mines. Hanging Wall—The upper wall; the rock or wall resting on the lode or vein. Deposit—A body of ore distinct from a ledge; a pocket of gravel or pay dirt. Croppings—Ledge matter lying upon the surface, or the outcropping of a vein. Upraise—Running a drift upward or rising above a shaft or level, instead of sinking. Winze—A shaft connecting one drift level with another, but not reaching to the surface. Horse—A mass of wall or rock or other barren matter protruding into an unbearing lode or fissure. Contact Lode—A lode lying between two different kinds of rock, as, for example, porphyry and slate. Bed-rock—The bed of a metalliferous deposit, commonly applied to the slate underlying auriferous gravel. Drifts—Tunnels leading off from the main shaft, or from other tunnels or levels through and along the vein. Lode—A longitudinal fissure or channel filled with ore bearing matter and having well-defined side walls; lode, lead, vein and ledge are synonymous. Reserves—Ore reserves are the vein material still standing in the mine between the shafts and the levels that have been driven in or through the vein. Cross-cut—A drift run at right angle to the ledge for the purpose of ascertaining its width and to otherwise prospect it; also an opening or level driven across the ground from one vein to another. Level—Drifts from the main shaft or from one shaft to another; an excavation run on the lode or vein, or ore body, at distances of from 50 to 100 feet apart and high enough for men to work in.
