

NOT OREGON LAND.

Contention of Washington Boundary Commissioners—Old Ship Channel Is the Line.

F. L. Rice, of South Bend, and J. B. Rice, of Cathlamet, who compose the Washington state boundary commission appointed by Governor Rogers to investigate the disputed boundary line between Oregon and Washington, have completed their work from the mouth of the Columbia river to Tongue Point. They find that vast and valuable tracts of tide lands besides valuable fishing and mining grounds, which are now claimed and taxed by Oregon, are in Washington according to the law establishing the territory of Washington and defining the boundary line between it and Oregon to be the center of the main ship channel of the Columbia river. The initial point at the mouth of the Columbia is two miles from Fort Stevens and four miles from Fort Canby on a line across the river connecting these two points. Thence the line follows the center of the main ship channel, which has remained practically the same since the boundary was defined first, until the confines of Wahkiakum county are reached, where the commission lays claim to considerable territory now held by Oregon.

Off Wahkiakum county the main channel was formerly up Woody's channel through the Cordell channel and thence into Woody's channel. This was buoyed by the government as early as 1853 and ran close to the Oregon shore. These channels are not now in use, as the construction of the jetty, which was expected, according to the United States engineer's report, to scour them out, in reality filled them up and throw the main channel over on the Washington shore. This shifting of the channel has formed valuable tide lands, including the well-known Miller and Oliver sands, which the commission claims for Washington on the ground that the channel and not the new one should be taken as the dividing line. This construction also throws into Washington territory the Desdemona and Middle sands which have never before been claimed by this state.

The commission has made a preliminary inspection of the boundary line up the river to a point above the Dalles and from all their information it would appear that Oregon claims and taxes everything in sight, including some lands which have as high as 100 families living on them.

If the contention of the commission proves to be correct, over 90 per cent of the tidelands and nearly all of the tidelands on the Columbia belong to Washington, and Oregon has no foundation to its claim of jurisdiction over Sand Island, which has been the cause even of bloodshed in years past.

Mr. Rice, the member of the commission from Cathlamet, has lived on the river for over 30 years and his personal knowledge of the location of the old channels and his wide acquaintance with the old-timers on the river are proving of great value.

Ship Oranges in Liquid Air.
The Fay Fruit Company, of Los Angeles, has made arrangements with Charles E. Tripler to use his processes and appliances for the manufacture and employment of liquid air. The object is to equip the refrigerator cars of the company so that liquid air can take the place of ice. Since the company sends East yearly over 2,000 carloads of citrus fruit, vegetables, dried fruits and nuts, and the great bulk of its shipments must be made in refrigerated cars, this matter is highly important. The plant which will be installed for liquifying air will also supply magne substance for use in every other conceivable way.

The New Steamer Line.
Captain W. J. Ellis, of the steamer Bay City, has a plan on foot which, if consummated, will insure to Bellingham bay for years to come a first-class steamboat service. Captain Ellis proposes to organize a steamboat stock company, composed of West Whatcom people, with stock subscribed to the amount of \$65,000 or \$75,000. He will take a large block of this stock, turning over in payment thereof the steamer Bay City, valued at \$20,000. A new steamer to cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000 would be built this winter and placed on the Whatcom-Seattle-Tacoma run.

Snake River Valley.
T. A. Harris, immigration agent for the Union Pacific and region Short Line, tells the Omaha Bee that the Snake river valley in Idaho is "the richest agricultural region in the West." It is being rapidly settled up, and the Short Line has just begun the extension of a line from Idaho Falls to St. Anthony, 40 miles distant, which will be completed in time to handle this fall's crops.

Ice Companies Amalgamated.
It will now become necessary for the people of Butte, Mont., to solve the question of whether ice is a luxury or a necessity. This decision is made necessary by the amalgamation of the different companies supplying ice, or rather the majority of these firms have been bought out by the Butte Ice Company.

OUR FINANCIAL POWER.

London Cannot Get From New York the Gold That It Needs.

R. G. Dunn & Co. in their weekly review of trade say:
July failures have been smaller than in any month of which there is record excepting May, and trading failures smaller than in any other month. Surprising contrasts are shown by comparisons of small with large failures in different years and in no class of business without some large failures not attributable to present influence, does the aggregate equal the average of the past six years. London again recognizes the financial power of this country. The Bank of England virtually admits that it cannot draw from New York the gold it needs; exchange moves to the importing point; over \$1,000,000 came from Sidney to San Francisco. London's net buying of stocks has been 40,000 shares and bills against produce to be shipped are very heavy.

This describes a repetition of finance not unlike that in industries. Europe is searching for wool here at 50 cents a pound, scoured, and for pig iron at \$20 a ton. A vast demand for both materials has fallen upon the commercial world which this country alone appears able to meet for its own needs. Wool shipments from Australia have been surprisingly little below those of last year, but Europe talks of a wool famine, while this country has on hand a year's consumption or more, besides this year's clip, and prices are not yet as high as they were in February of last year, when stocks were many millions of pounds larger.

Failures for the week have been 183 in the United States, against 196 last year, and 33 in Canada against 31 last year.

CURL LEAF.

Paper on the Treatment of Prune Trees No Assured.

The Oregon Board of Horticulture has been in receipt of many letters of inquiry regarding the curl leaf of the prune, and reporting that many trees are bursting, requesting directions how to correct the damage.

The bursting of prune trees, especially Italianas, is no doubt the result of damage done by the February frosts, which has proven so disastrous throughout the United States and Europe. In one of my communications in early March I predicted this, and even now look for more damage later in the season, especially in those orchards where the remedy of no care has been given. The remedy which I advised then and advise now is, which has given best results according to the reports of those who followed the advice given, is: Cut away carefully all bursted bark, cover the wound with either grafting wax or clay mixed with water; split the outer bark on the opposite side to give more sap flow, and wrap the whole with burlap and the wound will soon heal over.

Curl Leaf.

From many years observation I have come to the conclusion that all prune trees showing curl leaf are bark-bound, which naturally checks the sap flow, and is more pronounced in the Italian prune trees. I can readily account for the cause of some of them, for instance, those trees which are infected with gummosis or dead spot, but in the case of trees which are seemingly in a perfectly healthy condition the curl leaf is not readily accounted for, and calls for scientific investigation by some expert.

I have experimented some in that direction and found when I split the outer bark on bark-bound trees, whether the tightness was at the union or at the crown of individual limbs, or the entire length of the tree, from root to branch, that the under bark would come apart at once like a "shoddy cloth," and in a few days the curl would disappear, whereas, if you split the bark of a healthy tree, the cut made will not open to any appreciable degree.

I must confess that I am at a loss and not scientific enough to account for the "direct cause" of curl leaf. The only advice I can give, based upon experience, is: When curl leaf first begins to show, split the outer bark on three sides, from root to branch, care being taken not to cut through the inner bark, or to the wood, and if gummosis, or dead spot, is present, wash the cuts with Bordeaux mixture, full strength.

The more I study the matter of sun scald, bark-bursting, curl leaf, gummosis, etc., the more I become convinced that all our prunes should be top grafted on some suitable plum stock. When Hon. James Wilson, secretary of agriculture, favored us with a visit a short time ago, I had the pleasure of driving him through some of our orchards, and called his attention to this and other diseases, which require scientific investigation, requesting that some expert be sent to us for the purpose, and he promised to give it his best attention.

CRITICISES THE CAMPAIGN

Commander F. B. St. John Says Otis Is a Silly Old Man Without Ability. San Francisco, Aug. 11.—Specials from Victoria, B. C., state that Commander F. B. St. John, of the British warship Pasco, who has arrived there on the Empress of Japan, severely criticizes the management of the Philippine campaign by General Otis. He is quoted as saying that "General Otis is a silly old man without knowledge of the necessities or the responsibilities of his position, without ability to improve it. The very first action of his government should be his recall. It is a pitiful thing to see the sacrifice of the tall, splendid men of the American soldiery to his gross incompetency."

He also expressed the opinion that the American fatalities would aggregate 5,000, adding that the facts could not be told owing to the press censorship. He predicted that if Otis is left to direct the army of occupation the Americans will virtually be defeated, for, he said, "the rebels will be able to hold their own, save within the cities of Manila and Iloilo, and perhaps a few square miles around about, and do as they please."

Fired at Filipinos.
Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 11.—In connection with the arrival of United States Senator Beveridge from Manila, it is said that Mrs. Beveridge, who accompanied her husband, has the distinction of firing five shots at the Filipinos. While the senator was on the firing line one day he went for a drive, escorted by a squad of Tennessee soldiers. She ventured too far, and soon rebel bullets were falling about her carriage. A hasty retreat was begun. Mrs. Beveridge drew her revolver, which she had carried since her arrival at Manila, and fired five shots in the direction of the rebels, who could be seen skulking in the distance.

Port au Prince, Hayti, Aug. 11.
The latest news from Santo Domingo says the revolutionary movement is extending, and that the province of Vega is in arms. It is impossible to obtain any details here.

Roof Fell In.

San Francisco, Aug. 11.—Six firemen were injured at a fire which broke out tonight in the restaurant of Star & Owen, near the corner of Sixth and Market streets. The flames spread to the saloons of Horn Bros. and James Conway, and from there to an adjoining lodging-house. All of the buildings were of wood and only two stories high. Suddenly the roof of the market fell in, and several firemen were buried beneath the debris. They were quickly extricated, and all are expected to survive.

No Change at Hampton.
Washington, Aug. 11.—Surgeon Vickers wires Surgeon-General Wyman of the marine hospital service, from the Soldier's Home at Hampton, Va., as follows:
"No change; everything favorable. Nearly all in tents that can be moved. Disinfection of buildings being pushed along by Surgeon von Esch." The daily shipments of oil from the Indiana field amount to 36,111 barrels, and the run from the wells 9,864 barrels.

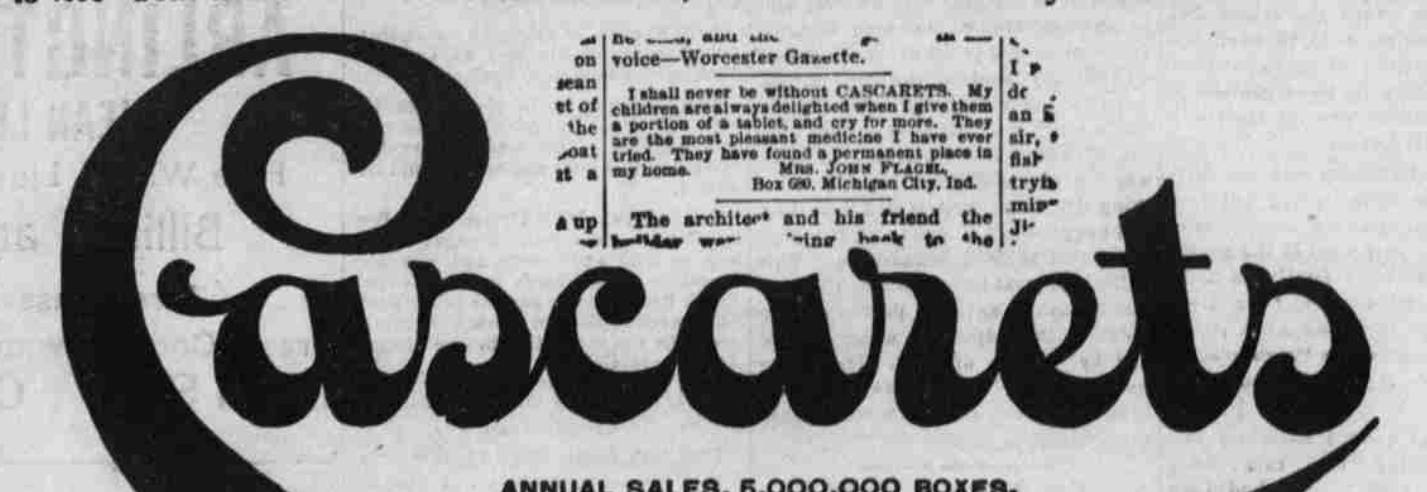
Mummy Photography.
