She at once gave the alarm and Dr. Franklin was at the scene within a few moments and gave him every attention. Barring complications, neither of the wounds are serious the blade having only penetrated the skin and severed a few veins. By way of explanation of the deed Clark stated that he has always been unlucky and that he thought it was time to end it all. He intimated that he would not be satisfied with the result but would try it again when the opportunity presents itself.
