Portage Road a Go.

The Milton Eagle says editorially:

"There is no longer any doubt about the portage road being built on the Washington side around the dunes of the Columbia, for there is capital behind the project that will carry it through. It will commence at Columbus and terminate either on the north side of the river opposite Crater point, or will cross the river to the Dalles. Thus it will be seen that the projected railroad from this city to the Columbia river will give us water competition to the seaboard. This is a matter that should not be lost sight of by our people. This line can be constructed by local capital and the cost of it saved in two years by reduction of freight rates."

The same remarks apply with equal force to Condon and Gilliam county. Once the obstructions in the Columbia are overcome and a rail line built from Condon to the river, southern and central Gilliam county will rapidly develop into one of the richest wheat belts in the northwest.
