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TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

An interesting Meeting. Good Attendance and Much Interest Manifested.

The Teacher's Institute, which has been in session here this week, is pronounced the most interesting and profitable meeting of the kind ever held in the county. Superintendent Daggett worked hard for the success of the session and to his untiring efforts, coupled with the excellent judgment displayed in selecting instructors, is largely due the success attained. The teachers are entitled to praise for their part in making the institute what it was, for they were there en masse and their regular attendance and lively interest in the work showed that they were determined to derive all the information possible from the meeting. Prof. Durette and Miss Drake, the instructors, gave excellent satisfaction and showed by the thorough character of their work that they had mastered many of the difficulties that lie in the path of those who are younger and less experienced in the noble profession of teaching. Prof. Durette gave instruction in Geography, History, Reading, School Management, Language, Spelling and Penmanship, while Miss Drake confined herself to Model Lessons in Primary work and Primary Physiology and Hygiene.

Rodgers, Condon; Mrs. E. L. Taylor and Mrs. O. B. Miles, Fossil and W. E. Parish, Mt. Vernon, Grant county Oregon.

The teachers, and citizens of the town were treated to two excellent lectures during the week. Prof. C. W. Durette talked Monday evening on "Home School and State" in a highly interesting and instructive manner. It is to be regretted that every parent and school officer in the county could not have heard this lecture. It was straight to the point. On Tuesday evening, State Superintendent Ackerman, spoke on "The Educational Outlook" which was also an excellent effort and was well received by those present. Superintendent Daggett made a few pointed remarks Monday evening on the shameful condition of many of the school buildings in the county and of the lack of interest in educational matters which we hope he will continue to repeat until there is a change for the better.
