No County Seat Agitation.

S. A. D. Gurley, of Arlington, writes to the Oregonian, in regard to the county seat question, as follows: "Referring to the interview with S. G. Hawson, an account of which appeared in your daily issue of the 21st, in which Mr. Hawson is reported to have said that the business men of Arlington propose to ask the next legislature to pass an act enabling Gilliam county citizens to reconsider the question of county seat, and that an attempt would be made to remove the county seat from Condon to Arlington, I wish to say that as a taxpayer and citizen of Arlington I most emphatically repudiate the assertion. There has not been nor is there now, any attempt on the part of the citizens of this place to agitate the county seat question. Mr. Hawson does not own any property here nor has he at any time been the holder or owner of any real estate in the town of Arlington; and is now, and has been for some time, to all intents and purposes, a resident of Multnomah county, or some county other than Gilliam.

The mere fact that this representative district contains about 6000 voters illustrates very forcibly the insignificance of this precinct in the election of a representative. I submit that Mr. Hawson does not represent the business men of this town when he outlines what he supposes to be the plan of campaign with reference to the county seat of this county. Whether or not the statements attributed to him were made for the purpose of attempting to array other sections of this county against Arlington, I shall leave to the consideration of others without expressing an opinion."
