With her children she came to Oregon in 1884 and since that time has been a resident of Gilliam county. Five children and eighteen grandchildren mourn her loss all of whom are residents of this county. The children are: Mrs. J. C. Cooney, Mrs. W. J. Russell, Mrs. W. J. Smith, R. E. Summers and M. E. Summers. The funeral occurred on Friday at 4 o'clock P. M. from the Catholic church at this place, the services being conducted by Rev. Father Shaw, of Portland. A large concourse of friends and neighbors followed the remains to their last resting place.
