While riding over a burn in the Cascade mountains near White river on Saturday of last week, Forest Supervisor Dufur's horse fell with him crushing him severely. The Dufur Dispatch says he had two ribs broken and was otherwise badly bruised, but his injuries will not necessarily prove dangerous.

It happened to be loaded however and Overholt was shot in the shoulder. It was thought at first to be only a slight wound but later developments proved it to be fatal, and Overholt died at 4 o'clock the following morning. —Hardman Homestead.

Tim Connolly's House Burned.

A report reached town Monday that Tim Connolly's house, on his place in Ferry Canyon, about 16 miles west of Condon, was destroyed by fire, with all its contents, a few days ago and that the fire is supposed to be of incendiary origin. John and Pat Connolly, Tim's brothers, had their trunks, clothing and other personal effects in the house all of which were destroyed. Besides burning the house the report says that a lot of Connolly's horses were run through a wire fence and a number of the animals were killed. About two miles of wire fence was also torn down and destroyed. It is stated that the Connollys have a pretty good idea who the perpetrators of the outrageous work are and it is to be hoped they will be brought to speedy and relentless justice. It is hard to believe that this section of Gilliam county contains citizens of such vicious proclivities but if such is the case the sooner they are apprehended and brought to justice the better for the county. There is a place prepared for such outlaws, near Salem, and there is where they properly belong.
