In putting the semi-annual financial statement into type last week, an explanatory note at the foot of the summary statement was inadvertently overlooked. This explanation shows our county to be in better financial condition than would appear by the statement as published.

Judge Mariner's letter published in our last issue, in regard to the Russian thistle pest, is most timely. The GLOBE believes that this noxious weed is a most serious menace to the agricultural and grazing interests of the county and gladly offers space in its columns for a full discussion of the pest and the best methods of eradicating it. In a matter like this nothing short of universal knowledge and united action can accomplish anything.

The British claim that the Boers are unprogressive and uncultured and that they must be conquered and put out of the way of the "grand onward march of civilization". If the 18th century methods and unpolished manners of the African Dutchmen have anything to do with their fighting qualities it will perhaps be a cold day when John Bull tackles any nation that is less progressive or less cultivated. NO DEMAND FOR WHEAT.

L. G. Pattullo, of Tacoma, representing Balfour, Guthrie & Company, was at the Hotel Pendleton a few days ago, says the East Oregonian. He has been looking up wheat matters in a general way in the county and informing himself on the condition of the crop of 1899.

Mr. Pattullo discussed the wheat situation briefly, saying: The market is dull, as every one knows. The situation is attributable to the absolute lack of demand in the world's markets. Then there is the element of high ocean freights. These have ruled high during the entire season and are yet far above the average.

"At one time this season, we could have paid 70 cents a bushel for blue stem of No 1 grade, but at the time could figure out only 63 at the sea board. This indicates, as you will see, that some element was entering into the market of the time, and that element was high ocean freights, which were six to seven cents above normal."
