Of course the Indian weather sages do not exactly and literally mean "no winter" but that the approaching winter will be very light in Oregon. They predicted "no summer" last spring, and while there was some summery weather, it was brief and interrupted. So Oregonians might as well take comfort in believing that the Indians are right, and that we will have but little winter weather beyond "occasional rain."—Telegram.

High Priced Wool and Beef. At \$70 a piece for steers and 15 cents a pound for wool, Eastern Oregon livestock men are not troubling themselves about combinations of buyers. If such combinations are controlling prices then stockmen hope the buyers will form a rockribbed trust and stick to their mutual agreements.

"James McHaley, of Grant county, had on hand the entire wool clip from his bands for 1897, 1898, and 1899. He had stubbornly refused to sell, in 1897 when he was offered 7 cents per pound for his mountain, high shrinkage wools, but decided to hold for better prices. He held over until 1898, and cut another clip, which he placed in the warehouse alongside the 1897 wool and again waited. The year 1899 came, and he once more removed the wool from his sheep, and he put that in the warehouse and held it.

"Wool crept upwards, and McHaley watched it ascend with considerable satisfaction. He had 104,793 pounds of the stuff, and finally sold it for 15 cents a pound to Silberman Bros. Mr. McHaley figures up his profits on holding his wool at just \$7000. No other wools known of here as unsold in all of Eastern Oregon.

"Robert Stanfield, a cattle raiser of the Echo country, has disposed of a lot of cattle, at a price said to be the highest ever received by a Umatilla county stockman since the country was settled. Oscar Thompson, of Morrow county, also sold to the same buyer, at the same price. They contracted with a Seattle firm for the delivery of about 150 head each at 5 1/4 cents a pound on the hoof. This will make each steer bring \$70. Each seller will receive about \$8500 for the little bunch of steers he turns over to the Seattle people."—Pendleton correspondent Oregonian.

The Portage Road.

The long talked of portage road around the dunes of the Columbia is no longer to be a dream, but will soon be a reality. The Central Construction & Transportation Company is now in readiness to go ahead with the enterprise and construction work will be commenced in a few days. A contract has been let to Chapman & Wise for building 14 miles of road commencing at the upper end of the proposed road and running west. Their grading outfit has arrived from above, where they have had a contract on Snake river and they will commence operations as soon as their teams are rested and hands can be secured. They expect to work about 200 men during the winter and if the season is favorable they will have all the grading work finished by next spring.—Times-Mountaineer.
