A Great System.

There is one man in President McKinley's cabinet who strictly attends to business. That man is Charles Emory Smith, postmaster general. The department under his wise administration is becoming more and more efficient. The marvelous growth of the business of the post office is shown by the fact that in 1880 the department expended \$36,000,000 and had a revenue of \$33,000,000. In 1898 expenditures will be about \$105,000,000, and the revenues will be over \$100,000,000. In the twenty years in which population has increased 50 per cent the business of the postal service has increased 300 per cent. The revenues are increasing faster than the expenditures while the service is growing better and better. In a short time the deficit will be wiped out and when it is one cent postage for letters will be considered.—E. O.

The Russian Thistle.

OLEX, Or., Nov. 26 (To the Editor.)—Allow me a little space in your columns to comment on the Russian thistle question. I see where Judge Mariner excuses himself by not knowing what the Russian thistle is. I think he could have ascertained what it is by making a visit to the eastern part of the county. I understand the attention of the county court was called to the matter and if I understand the law aright ignorance of the law excuses no one. Morrow county had crews at work for over a month doing good work in this line while Gilliam county was dormant except in the eastern part where they did some good work. If I understand the law aright some have laid themselves liable in the eyes of the law and ought to be looked after. If the county officials want to see what the Russian thistle looks like I would suggest that some one take them over in the Eightmile country and show them what it looks like. Where the thistle has a good show it grows from two to three feet high and about the same size in circumference. When the wind blows it rolls and jumps like a tumble weed. It is very productive and does best on summer fallow ground. Morrow county is complaining about the way Gilliam county has neglected this pest and they are not to be blamed for doing so. Hoping no one will excuse themselves by not knowing what the Russian thistle is.
