Inland Company Interested.

U. B. Hopkins, of Spokane, president of the Inland Telephone Company, called Mayor Dunn up by 'phone Tuesday evening to make some inquiries in regard to the feasibility of that company's extending their lines from this place to Lone Valley, Lone Rock, and Heppner. Mr. Hopkins had learned from a recent issue of the Globe that the people of Lone Valley propose to build a line of their own to Condon and at once became interested in the proposition as a possible field for further extension of the Inland system. After numerous inquiries in regard to the probable business for such a line, Mr. Hopkins stated that he was about to leave for San Francisco to attend a meeting of the board of directors of the company and that he would bring the matter before them. He seemed to think the chances were good that the line would be built. Such a line would be a great advantage to Condon as it would put it in closer touch with a large area of rich territory of which this place is the natural trading point. It now costs 50 cents to telephone from Condon to Lone Rock via the present circuitous route while with a direct line as proposed by the Inland company the rate would be cut in half. We understand that the present rate from Heppner to Lone Rock over the Blue Mountain line is 65 cents and from Heppner to Arlington 75 cents, the lower rate from Condon being due to a tariff arrangement between the two companies. It would appear then that the people of Lone Rock and Heppner would hail with joy the completion of the proposed line as it would effect a large yearly saving to them in telephone charges.

The Inland company is much more reasonable in its charges than the Blue Mountain and other lines operating in Eastern Oregon and for that reason we hope to see the proposed line built.
