EASTERN vs WESTERN MEN.

Stinging, cutting, yet delivered not without cause, are the following words uttered from the lips of Miss Ada Roberts, daughter of B. H. Roberts, against the gentlemen (?) of our national capital for the disgraceful, ungenerous and unkind remarks emanating from their foul and besmirched lips.

"Not the slightest restraint seems to govern these people that their audible remark might be distasteful to me. On the contrary, I know that on several occasions the rude people who indulged in these spiteful sayings were highly gratified by reason of the fact that I heard and understood the significance of their jests.

Contrasting the East and the West I have this to say; that were I at home, were I among the men of the West, not even the bitterest enemy of my father, or of our cause, would permit me to be so persecuted. Men of the style and fashion of the East do not flourish in the West. There is a vigorous manhood there, which would stoop to hurt a woman's feelings.

"I am certainly surprised at my experience in the East. It is as different to me as a foreign country. The indecency of eastern people with whom I have come in contact is beyond description. It transcends all legitimate curiosity. I might go up and down the west alone, unprotected and in communities absolutely hostile to my father and myself and never be subject to such annoyance and insult.

Our civilization is certainly different. A woman is something far more sacred in my country than here. If such little pettinences should occur, there are big, strong men out there who would so impress the lesson on the offenders that they would remember not to offend again, even if they were so dense and ignorant that they did not understand the indecency of their offenses.

Death of Father Briody.

An aged priest, named Thomas Briody, stopping at the Home for the Aged, on East Twentieth and East Irving streets, fell dead while quietly walking along the sidewalk near the Home yesterday evening. His death was not unexpected, as he has been afflicted for several years and quite seriously of late. Father Briody was several years ago located in the diocese of New Orleans, where he suffered from a severe attack of yellow fever. He never fully recovered. From that time until his death he was never able to perform the full functions of his office, and received lighter charges adapted to his sadly diminished strength. Four years ago he came to the Oregon diocese. For a period he was stationed down in Coos county, but two weeks ago he became so ill that he was removed to the Home, where the kindest attention was given him. While he at times showed signs of returning strength, it was apparent to physicians that his days were not many. Death came while taking a little exercise near the home, and was quite sudden. The funeral will take place from the cathedral Thursday, the services being held at A. M. The remains will be buried in Mount Calvary cemetery—Oregonian.
