Democratic State Convention.

A call has been issued for the democratic state convention to meet in Portland, Thursday, April 12, 1900, for the purpose of electing delegates to the National Democratic Convention and nominating a state ticket. The representation will be based on the vote for supreme judge in 1898, one delegate for each 150 voters and one at large for each county. Under this rating Gilliam county will be entitled to three delegates. The central committee of each county is requested to fix the time for holding their own primaries and county conventions. All delegates elected to the state convention are urged to attend in person.
