With a contagious disease among us every citizen should be alive to the importance of keeping his premises in a first class sanitary condition. Clean up the back yard stables etc and lessen the chances of an epidemic.

SALTING WHEAT LANDS

Under the direction of B. Campbell, traffic manager of the O. R. & N., some interesting experiments are being made by Colonel R. C. Judson, industrial agent for the company. One of them is the use of salt on grain land to retain moisture.

Colonel Judson, who has just returned from Blalock, in reference to his work said: "Back of Blalock, extending to Rock creek and beyond, is a large area of grain land. Owing to the very heavy rainfall, beginning in October and continuing up to the present time, the grain has thrived finely. The outlook for an extra good crop is favorable.

While at the farm I arranged with a couple of farmers to test the preservation of moisture in land by the use of salt. This is no new idea. It has been tried in the East. I shall salt the fields during different stages of the growth of the grain and keep an accurate account for publication, so that farmers desiring to use it may know how to go about it. These tests will show whether or not we can retain moisture in the ground during the ripening season. I find that in Eastern Oregon the prevailing warm winds during ripening season, damage the crops.

Mr. Campbell under whose direction I am working, has already purchased the salt, and it is now in storage ready for use. Tests will be made, not only at the point mentioned but also in the Walla Walla and Umatilla valleys. I shall use 300 pounds of salt to the acre.

While at Blalock I examined the Smead fruit farm. To my notion it is the best cultivated orchard in the Northwest. It is certainly the best trimmed and kept of any I have visited. The trees have wintered finely and will be loaded with fruit. The buds on apricot, hectarine, peach, pear, cherry and prune trees are not swelled yet so as to be hurt by the frost, and as no frost visits the valley of the Columbia east from Grant after March 1, I predict an enormous yield.

Oom Paul Kruger has notified our government that the latest consignment of Hay from this country is not what it should be and declines to receive it, giving as his reason that it was put up too green, and has a very pronounced English flavor. Oom Paul knows a thing or two.

The appointment of young Hay snacks more of English nobility than it does of Americanism. He was appointed because he happened to be the son of his father, and therefore first in line of succession to a fat soap. Just when the United States needed an experienced diplomat in the Transvaal it sent a green kid. No wonder Oom Paul refused to accept him.

ARLINGTON.

The council will probably pass an ordinance quarantining some of the near-by Washington towns on account of a malignant form of diphtheria which prevails there. The smallpox scare will also be considered.

The reported smallpox at Condon has caused a feeling of uneasiness here as we are closely connected by stage communication and otherwise. People here think that Mr. Wilson did very wrong to come direct from the house in Condon that contained the case of smallpox and possibly exposed someone to that dread disease. There was no cause left the city officials but to request him to occupy the city hall over night and to return home the next morning. Because one is exposed to any contagious malady is no excuse for not thinking of others. Arlington will try to keep her subjects at home should smallpox develop here.
