E. P. Weir, Chairman. Democratic Club.

The Gilliam county Jeffersonian Democratic Club was organized at this place last Saturday. Sam E. Van Vactor was elected temporary chairman and P. H. Stephenson was chosen as temporary secretary. A committee, composed of S. A. Pattison, W. L. Wilcox, and Andrew Greiner was appointed to draft resolutions setting forth the name and object of the club after which the following permanent officers were elected; President, Sam E. Van Vactor; Vice president, Andrew Greiner; Secretary, P. H. Stephenson; Treasurer, Ed Dunn. The club was organized with almost 70 members. After a short conference the club adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

City Election. A full vote was polled at the city election Tuesday and the day passed quietly without riots or disturbances of any kind in fact, as compared with an election day in Kentucky, it was rather a tame affair.

Mayor Dunn was elected to succeed himself by a unanimous vote there being no other candidate in the field. This was a splendid endorsement of Mr. Dunn's administration of municipal affairs during the past two years.

There were seven candidates named on the printed tickets for councilmen, four to be elected, but when the vote was canvassed it was found that the name of W. L. Wilcox, had been written on a sufficient number of ballots to insure his election. We understand that Mr. Wilcox declined to be a candidate but the voters would not have it that way.

Charles Fix received a higher number of votes than any other candidate for councilman which shows that his good work as a member of that body in the past has not been forgotten. Fred Wilson and Frank Springston came in with good big votes and were elected on their first venture into the tangled web of city politics.

Being a silver democrat P. H. Stephenson got elected by a vote of almost 16 to 1 and E. A. May downed his opponent just 5 to 1. Following is the vote.

The result has been most gratifying. So far as we know no other town in the state that has been visited by the small pox has been so fortunate in getting rid of it.
