The Populist Convention.

By an oversight the Globe was not furnished with a report of the Populist county convention, which met in this city on Saturday, March 31, in time for our last issue, which accounts for the delay of the report which follows: The convention met at 10 o'clock A. M. in the rear room in Armory hall and was well attended by representatives of the party from the different precincts. W. J. Edwards of Mayville was elected chairman and F. B. Moore of the same precinct was elected secretary. A lengthy discussion of the present political outlook was then held, which was characterized by the utmost harmony, and after a careful review of the situation it was unanimously agreed that the party would not put a county ticket in the field for the coming campaign. F. B. Moore was elected chairman of the county central committee for the ensuing two years, and the following gentlemen were elected as delegates to the State Convention, which is in session in Portland to-day: W. J. Edwards, B. K. Searcy, Oscar Maley and F. B. Moore.

ARLINGTON.

The Public School closed here last Friday with an interesting programme. The stage has been loaded down to the gunwales of late. Last Sunday there were ten passengers going towards Condon. W. W. Weatherford, who has been sick for some time, is holding his own, with little hope of recovery. Mr. Henry Little and Mrs. Telis were married at the Baptist church last Sunday evening after church services. Mrs. Telis was formerly of Matney Flat. Wm. Lindsey, from Montana, bought from Charles McAllister 140 head of fine hocks the first of the week, and shipped them from this place. There has been light frosts several nights but not heavy enough to kill tender plants, and if the next ten days pass without a freeze there will be a heavy crop of fruit. The city has had a system of pipes laid in the park and in a few years the Arlington park will be the finest grove in the county. The trees are mostly locust and are about fourteen years old. The park was donated to the city by J. W. Smith, who had spent several thousand dollars on it.
