Three State Conventions.

The democratic state convention met in the Chamber of Commerce, at Portland, on Thursday last week, at 10:30 A. M. State Chairman, H. S. Sheridan, called the convention to order and Geo. G. Chamberlain, of Multnomah, was chosen chairman by acclamation. The populists met on the same day and elected Frank Williams chairman and Dr. Ernest Barton secretary. After a consultation between a conference committee from each convention a fusion agreement was reached and the following ticket was nominated by the united parties: Presidential electors—Walter M. Pierce, dem., of Pendleton; Dell Stuart, dem., of Portland; Ernest Kroner, pop., of Portland; John Whitaker, pop., of Benton.

Congressman, First District—Dr. Bernard Daly, dem., of Lakeview.

Congressman, Second District—State Senator William Smith, pop., of Baker City.

Supreme Judge—W. M. Ramsey, dem., of Salem.

Food and Dairy Commissioner—W. Schulmerich, pop., of Washington county.

For Joint Senator, 20th district—E. B. Dufar of The Dalles.

For Joint Senator, 21st district—which includes Gilliam county—V. G. Cozad of Canyon City.

For Joint Senator, ninth district—A. S. Bennett of The Dalles.

Representatives for 28th district—W. J. Edwards of Mayville, R. E. Miesner of Mitchell, T. E. Coon of Hood River.

Representative for 21st district—G. Springer of Crook.

Office of District Attorney left vacant, to be filled in by central committee.

Delegates to the national convention at Kansas city are:

J. H. Raley of Pendleton, J. O. Booth of Josephine, M. A. Miller of Lebanon, A. S. Bennett of The Dalles, John Welch of Portland, R. Veatch, of Lane, Charles Nickell of Jacksonville, N. A. Peary of Portland, Alternates—J. D. McKim of La Grande, A. J. Knott of Portland, W. F. Butcher of Baker, Jeff Myers of Salem, Chas. M. Wait of Canby, E. E. Wilson of Corvallis.

The republicans met on the same day in the Marquam theatre, and after being called to order by State Chairman Geo. Steel, O. F. Paxton was chosen as chairman and C. E. Cochran as secretary.

For Presidential electors—Tilman Ford of Salem, A. C. Fullerton of Roseburg, O. F. Paxton of Portland, W. J. Furnish of Pendleton.

For Congress, 2nd district—M. A. Moody of Wasco.

Supreme Judge—C. E. Wolverton.

Food and Dairy Commissioner—F. Bailey.

In the district convention the following nominations were made:

W. W. Steiner of Fossil, joint senator for the 21st district, comprising the counties of Grant, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler.

J. N. Williamson of Prineville, joint senator for the ninth district, comprising the counties of Klamath, Lake, Crook and Wasco.

T. H. Johnson of Dufar, joint senator for the 20th district, comprising the counties of Wasco and Sherman.

J. A. Emmett of Klamath, representative for the 21st representative district, comprising the counties of Wasco, Crook, Klamath and Lake.

T. H. McCreer of Antelope, A. S. Roberts of The Dalles, and G. W. Miller of Arlington, representatives for the 28th district, comprising the counties of Grant, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler, which district is entitled to three representatives jointly.

Frank Menefee of The Dalles, district attorney for 7th judicial district, comprising the counties of Crook, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler. There was a hot fight for this nomination, and it took eight ballots to settle it. On the 7th ballot Nick Sinnott received 13 votes, John Horsford 13, and there was one blank. On the 8th Sinnott received 13 and Menefee 14.
