Obituary.

Died, of heart failure, at his home in Brownville, Or., April 23rd, 1900, W. E. Baird, father of Mrs. Julia Henderson of Mayville, in the 86th year of his age.

Mr. Baird was one of Oregon's pioneers, having crossed the plains to California in '49, and after returning to his Eastern home recrossed them in '53 to make his home in Oregon.

He was one of the men best known as a "Home Missionary" in the early days—distributing bibles, founding Sunday schools, and aiding in all ways possible the cause of Christianity.

In later years he was a minister of the Presbyterian church, his field being in and about La Grande, Or., where he lived until too aged to work longer in his chosen vocation.

Twenty years ago the wife of his youth preceded him to the better land. In his later years he married again and his wife survives him.

He leaves six children—Mrs. Julia A. Henderson of Mayville, Mrs. Harriet Smith of Harley, Mrs. Maggie Blakely of Pendleton, Mrs. J. D. Titus of Canyon City, Mrs. Tillie Durbin of Antelope, and Mr. W. B. Baird of Brownsville.

Mr. Baird died as he had lived, at peace with God and man. Thus pass away, one by one, the strong, true souls that have hewn out the way of righteousness, smoothed the rough paths for tender feet, and by precept and example taught the truths and beauties of the Word of God. E. B. F.
