A pleasant dance was given in the Armory hall Friday evening. A large number of devotees of the terpsichorean art were present and all passed a merry evening.

Obituary.

Mrs. Jane Keys, wife of Wm. Keys, of Mayville, died suddenly at her home at that place on Sunday morning, May 20, 1900.

Mrs. Keys was born in County Tyrone, Ireland, 1822. She made an early profession of Christianity and united with the Presbyterian church, until called to swell the ranks of the Church Triumphant.

At about 33 years of age she united in marriage with Wm. Keys. In 1865 they removed to Delaware county, Ind., and after a residence of two years at that place they removed to Oregon, living in Roseburg 6 years, and in 1878 removing to the vicinity of Mayville where since they have made their home, and from which place Mrs. Keys heard and obeyed the summons of her Lord to "Come up higher."

She leaves a husband, son and two daughters to mourn her loss.

Funeral services were held at Mayville, Monday, at 3 p.m., conducted by F. D. Healy, pastor of the Congregational church of Condon.

A large concourse of friends followed the remains to the Mayville cemetery, where the interment took place.

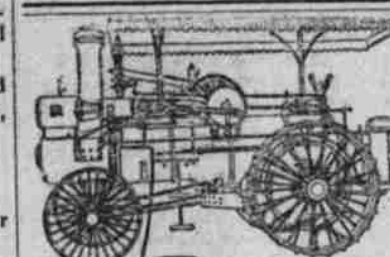

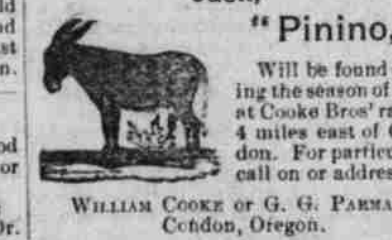

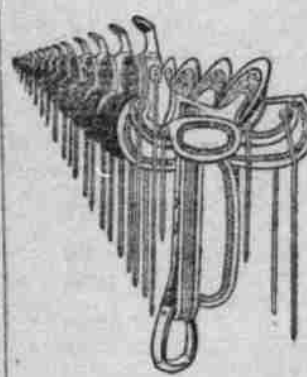
