Letter From Cape Nome.

Mr. John F. Pinkham has just received, under date of June 14, a letter from his son, Frank Pinkham, who is at Nome in the employ of a San Francisco company, from which we are permitted to make the following interesting extracts:

"We are now about five miles from Nome and I am very glad of it as I am sick of life on board ship. We have had a very pleasant trip, smooth all the way. I have not been sick since leaving Seattle. We left there on the 20th at 12 M. and stopped at Tacoma and Port Townsend. We passed Dutch Harbor on Sunday evening, the 17th just as a steerage passenger died of pneumonia. We did not stop but went right on north until we struck the ice on the 19th. We did not get out again for eight days and as we then had our bow stove in and leaking badly we had to put back to Dutch Harbor after being within 150 miles of Nome. We stayed in Dutch Harbor and Unalakleet till June 10th when we left at 6 A. M. and have managed to come through without seeing over 100 miles of ice altogether. Several steamers were here already and several have been damaged. We passed the steamer South Portland last evening, and helped her through the ice to clear water. She had a large hole in her bow covered with canvas. The steamer Cleveland is reported to be on the beach at Nome. The 'Catherine Sudden' we left two weeks ago in the ice pack with her bows crushed and the crew intending to abandon her. We had left her about an hour when the brig Pitearin went to her relief. This is a terrible trip. For two weeks we have had nothing but stew, salt horse and hash. The first steamer, the Albaton, arrived here May 27. The whaler bark, Alaska, was driven on shore here June 6, a total loss of freight and vessel. The Catherine Sudden, towed by Cutter Corwin, dismasted with 7 feet of water in her hold, was sold at auction today. As far as the eye can see along the beach there is nothing but tents. We have not gone ashore yet but will go as soon as they can get the baggage and lighters unloaded. The steamer Ohio arrived an hour before we did with a case of small pox on board and is now in quarantine. The schooner Eclipse is being towed in by a steam launch having been crushed by the ice and there are unconfirmed reports of several other wrecks.

Later, we have just received the report that the Brig Pitearin and the schooner Eclipse are lost with all on board.
