A QUERY

At the time of the recent election the county treasurer's notice, published in the Globe, called for redemption, all county warrants registered prior to July 1, 1898. This notice was dated January 30, 1899. On June 14th the notice was changed, calling in all warrants registered prior to October 14, 1898, and on June 23rd it was again changed calling in all warrants registered prior to January 1, 1893, bringing forward the redemption of county warrants just six months in less than 30 days.

During the month of June warrants were redeemed to the amount of \$7629.34. During the same month the treasurer received the sum of \$4168.83, and when the office changed hands, July 1st, the outgoing treasurer turned over to his successor, the sum of \$397.41.

QUERY—Was this large redemption of county warrants—more than \$7000 in less than a month—and the consequent saving of interest thereon to the taxpayers, a direct result of the defeat of Mr. Barker for the office of county treasurer and would the redemption of county warrants have been brought forward six months within 30 days if he had been elected?

Some Good Wheat.

A. J. Moore and W. S. Myers each have samples of wheat from their ranches on exhibition at the Gilliam county fair, which would go far towards establishing the claim that Gilliam county is the banner wheat county of the Northwest. Mr. Moore's sample consists of Blue Stem and Little Club, some of the heads of the first named variety measuring almost six inches in length and containing over 80 plump grains while the Little Club heads, although shorter are more compact and exceed the Bluestem in number of grains. Mr. Myers' sample is of the Little Club variety and similar in quality to the Moore sample. Mr. De Sani, who recently came from Iowa, secured a dozen heads of the Moore sample to send to friends in the Hawkeye state and he thinks it will be the means of inducing some more desirable immigration from that state to Gilliam county.

Death of Judge O. N. Denny.

Saturday last Judge Denny passed away at Long Beach, where he had gone, hoping to be benefited in health. Judge Denny was born in Ohio in 1838. He came to Oregon when quite young; had served as county judge in Wasco county in an early day; was a state senator for four years; served under Gen. Grant's administration as collector of internal revenue; was consul general to China for a number of years; secretary of the republican state central committee; municipal judge of Portland and confidential adviser to the king of Korea for several years at a salary of \$12,000 per year. He had traveled the world over; was better acquainted with affairs in the Orient than almost any man in the United States. He knew nearly all of the public men in this country and was an intimate friend of Gen. Grant during his lifetime. While consul general to China he entertained Grant eight days at the consulate. It was there that Li Hung Chang first met the general, being introduced to him by Judge Denny.

The Judge always took a lively interest in public affairs. He was a man who was always loyal to his friends, he leaves a devoted wife and other relatives to mourn his loss.

In his death the state and nation have suffered the loss of a patriotic, upright and honorable citizen, who served his country faithfully in every position to which he was chosen.—Arlington Record.
