Geo. Smith Meets With Loss at Olex. Ignited by Spark From Engine. Other Olex News.

Smith's steam thrasher, operating on Claude Randall's grain, near this place, set fire to the straw stack last Saturday morning and in a short space of time the separator was consumed. Many Scapls, Little Money. A statement recently issued by Secretary of State Dunbar shows that a large number of scarp bounty certificates have been filed in his office for which warrants have been issued and that but little money is on hand with which to redeem them. The total number of scapls reported by the respective County Courts from May 6, 1899 to June 30, 1900, was 39451. This number, at \$2 each, amounts to the sum of \$78902. The amount for which warrants have been issued, while the State Treasurer has received only about \$1365 applicable to the payment of scarp bounty warrants. Of this amount he has paid out \$520, leaving only about \$845 on hand.

Gilliam county has turned in certificates representing 1387 scapls or \$2774, or leave word at the Globe office.
