A New Thresher. The Little Giant thresher and tread-power recently purchased by G. G. Parman and Frank Moore is doing excellent work and more than fulfilling the expectations of the owners. As much as 300 bushels of wheat has been threshed in a half a day, and a header with three headerbeds fails to keep the machine going. The threshing is done with the work of three extra men and six horses, besides the heading crew, and the grain is put in the sack, ready for market, with but little more labor than is required to put it in the stack by the usual method. Three horses are worked on the power at a time but they are changed about every 2 1/2 hours. The machine does excellent work and, Mr. Parman thinks, will soon pay for itself as a grain saver.
