Son Advises Father.

Condon, Oregon, September 9, 1900. DEAR FATHER:—I was very sorry that you allowed your last letter to me to be published in the Condon Times...

I have been reading a little, father, since I left home. I am fully convinced that you are in error in many of your political views.

The old sorrel mare was a very good animal, father, but I doubt if she would bring more than \$45 now. The horse that Crawford bought was for the U. S. cavalry.

Now, father, you are laboring under a serious delusion if you think Skinner can get 27 cents for his wool. He stored it at the Dallas last spring and would be too glad to take 20 cents, but he can't get an offer.

You are surely wrong about the trusts, father. Don't you remember when I bought the Magore place? I paid \$3.15 for wire, laid down at Condon, to fence in the place. Last spring when I built that string of fences through the center of my place I paid \$6.10 for the same kind of wire. Nails that we could buy then—and four years ago—for 2 1/2 cents, cost 7 cents now. Wages have increased very little.

In another column of the Times supplement I noticed a reference made in regard to the increased circulation of gold, and, fearing that you might be misled by this sophistry, I wish to cite you to a few facts that will account for the increased circulation of gold, not taking Mr. McKinley or the Republican party into consideration.

During the last two years more than eight billions of gold have been taken from mother earth, and during the fifty years immediately preceding this, only a trifle over seven billions were mined.

Does not this seem a better reason for the increase in the circulation of gold than to attribute it to the Republican administration?

I know, father, that you are in earnest when you speak of, "The wise, thoughtful and patriotic administration of Mr. McKinley," but I don't see it just that way. When the chief executive says: "Forbidding annexation is criminal aggression," and then proceeds to do that very thing, I do not consider him wise, thoughtful or patriotic. And if he is carrying out the principles of the Republican party by so doing, I do not feel like supporting him.

I hope, father, that you will get the wool from over your eyes before next November.
