Dr. Coryell and family, of Mayville, were in town yesterday.

John Shriver left Tuesday morning for Walla Walla on a business trip.

Mrs. C. W. Crossfield has returned from an extended visit at Portland and Waco.

E. A. and A. H. Cooke, of Tacoma, sons of L. L. Cooke, attended court here last week.

Dr. Laster and Fred George came out from Arlington Sunday night to give testimony in the Cooke case.

Miss Minerva Neal, who has been suffering from an attack of septic fever, is reported much better.

The regular panel of jurors was excused from further attendance at court Thursday evening with the exception of those who were accepted as jurors on the Cooke murder case.

A large number of friends of the bride were present to witness the ceremony. The young couple will have the best wishes of a host of friends.

J. H. Downing returned Monday from his California trip. Mr. Downing went to the Golden state for the purpose of closing a deal for the sale of his 21-acre fruit ranch at San Jose, but after looking over the place again he decided to keep it. He says crops are good in some parts of California but nowhere did he see crops to equal those of grand old Gilliam county.

Cash A. Simpson and Ed McKinney, sheepmen of Condon, Gilliam county, purchased, early this week from John Silvers of John Day, a band of 2000 head of ewes, which they obtained at \$2.00 per head. The figure paid is considerably less than the present price, yet the price of sheep has declined some of recent date in the Eastern markets.—Eagle.

Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Brown, of Snipston, returned last Saturday from a visit with Mr. Brown's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Brown, of Dallas, Polk county. On their return from Dallas Mr. and Mrs. Brown left their children Jay and Pearl at the Dallas, where they will attend school. Pearl was placed in the Sisters' school, and Jay will attend the public school.

MANSLAUGHTER

The Verdict of the Jury in the Cooke Case. Sentenced to Five Years Imprisonment.

The trial of L. L. Cooke for the murder of James Collins on the 8th of last June at the Junction House, seven miles this side of Arlington, was commenced in the circuit court on Thursday morning. As announced in our issue of that day, Cooke entered a plea of "not guilty" on Wednesday and the case was set for 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

At the hour set the work of empaneling a jury was begun and continued until a late hour that night, when, after exhausting the regular panel of 31 jurors and a special venire of 20 others, the trial jury was completed. The personnel of the jury is as follows: J. W. Phillips, Fred Hanna, Mike Schewe, A. Hartman, F. H. Douglas, J. W. Elbert, Jesse O. Lewis, D. F. Stricklin, J. J. Wason, W. B. Smith, Marion Lanferson and John Palmer. Promptly at 9:30 Friday morning the real work on the case was commenced. Fred Wilson, of The Dalles, assistant prosecuting attorney for this district, made the opening statement to the jury on behalf of the state, outlining the course which the prosecution expected to follow in the trial. He was followed by Judge A. S. Bennett, also of The Dalles, who outlined the course of evidence to be followed by the defense. The statements of both gentlemen were brief and to the point and there was but little delay on either side in bringing the matter to trial. The examination of the witnesses for the state was commenced at about 10:30 Friday morning and the evidence adduced was, in the main, the same as that given at the coroner's inquest at the time of the killing, which was published in the GLOBE of June 14.

Dr. Ruedy, of Arlington, coroner of Gilliam county, who conducted the inquest, and Mrs. R. Q. Ashbaugh, who was the only eye witness to the shooting, were the principal witnesses, although all the members of the coroner's jury were placed on the stand and required to tell what they had learned of the affair at that time.

Mrs. Ashbaugh testified that she saw Mr. Collins drive to the rye field on his mower on the morning of the 8th of June and begin cutting the grain; that shortly afterwards she saw Mr. Cooke driving a band of horses down the canyon, and that, when he saw Collins, he left the horses and rode to where he was; that she saw Cooke shoot, saw the smoke and heard the report, and saw Collins sink down; that later Cooke came to her house and asked her husband to go with him and assist in taking Collins to the house, as he was badly hurt; that later Cooke again came to her house and said to her, "This is a sad day for me. He is dead and I don't know what they will do with me, but if I had it to do over again I would do the same thing."

Given in brief the story of the sad affair, as gleaned from the evidence on both sides, is substantially as follows:

The two men had had more or less trouble for several years. Two or three years ago Collins had Cooke and his son arrested on a charge of cutting wire fences. They were acquitted, and soon afterwards young Cooke became insane and was committed to the asylum at Salem. Some time last spring Cooke fled on a homestead, the tract embracing a piece of land which Collins had fenced and was cultivating, the same being at that time sown to rye. In April an item of local correspondence from the Junction House neighborhood appeared in one of the Arlington papers, which Collins received and the authorship of which he attributed to Cooke. A few days after said item was published Cooke and Collins met at a neighbor's house and a fight ensued, in which Cooke was severely beaten by Collins, receiving injuries which laid him up for two or three weeks. As the spring and early summer passed, the crop of rye on the land in question approached maturity, and it seems that both men claimed it. Cooke, it appears, made certain threats against Collins in case he should attempt to cut the rye, but whether or not he warned Collins not to cut it, before the fatal morning, does not appear. As before stated, the only witness to the shooting was Mrs. Ashbaugh, and she was almost one-half mile away, so there was no evidence offered as to whether or not there was any dispute or altercation immediately prior to the shooting.

Only one witness was examined Monday morning, and at 10:30 a. m. District Attorney Menefee opened the argument for the state, and in a clear, logical plea to the jury set forth the case of the state. Mr. Menefee was followed by H. H. Hendricks, of Fossil, associate counsel for the defense, in a short address, and the court then took a recess until 1:00 p. m. At that hour Judge A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, addressed the jury in one of his best efforts, his speech lasting for one and one-half hours. Judge Bennett is recognized as one of the ablest criminal lawyers in the state, and his earnest, impassioned plea to the jury was at once forceful and affecting. Fred Wilson, Esq., of The Dalles, followed Judge Bennett, in the closing argument for the state. Mr. Wilson, while one of the younger members of the bar in this district, is one of its most gifted orators, and his address to the jury was one of the most eloquent efforts ever listened to in this county.

After receiving instructions from the court the jury retired at about 4:00 p. m. to consider a verdict. At 7:00 they came in for further instructions and, returning to the jury room, continued their labors until almost 2 o'clock the following morning, when they announced that they had arrived at a verdict. The court was hastily summoned and the verdict

was read. The finding was for manslaughter, with a recommendation for the mercy of the court.

On the first ballot the jury stood one for murder in the second degree, six for manslaughter and five for acquittal. About a dozen ballots were taken before a verdict was reached.

At 9 o'clock Tuesday morning Cooke was brought into court for sentence, he having waived his right to further time, and after a few feeling remarks from his counsel, Judge Bennett, the court proceeded to pass sentence, the punishment being fixed at five years' imprisonment in the penitentiary. Deputy Sheriff Pinkham and Geo. Tatom left for Salem with the prisoner in the same day.

Killing at Arlington.

Another killing has been added to Gilliam county's list for this year, the latest being the shooting of William Jones, a negro, at Arlington at an early hour last Saturday morning, by Frank Farrier, who was acting as deputy marshal at the time. It appears that a burglary had occurred at the store of Mays & Crowe at The Dalles the evening before, and the marshal of that city had wired all other points along the railroad to be on the lookout for the robbers, and when the east-bound train reached Arlington at 3:30 a. m. the marshal and his deputy were at the depot on the watch. Jones was beating a ride on the tracks and when the train stopped at Arlington he started to crawl from under the car. Farrier saw him and, pointing a revolver in his face, ordered him to throw up his hands. Jones did not comply, and the officer again made the demand, with the additional statement that if he did not do so he would shoot. Jones said "I guess you will have to shoot," and the marshal pulled the trigger. The negro started to run and the officer shot again. Jones was almost instantly killed.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict that Jones came to his death by a gun shot wound inflicted at the hands of Frank Farrier, he being at the time a regularly deputized officer of the city of Arlington.

Farrier was arrested and his preliminary hearing was set for Wednesday.

It is said that Jones was well known in Portland and had many friends there. His business was hotel porter and waiter and he is said to have been on his way to Walla Walla, to go to work in a hotel at that place at the time of his death.

LATER—At the preliminary hearing, yesterday, Farrier was found not guilty and was discharged from custody.

A touch of romance appeared in the circumstances of this wedding from the fact that when the date which had been fixed for the wedding day approached, the doctor was seriously ill and unable to make the trip to claim his bride, so she came to him, arriving on Friday's stage. Immediately after the ceremony the happy couple took possession of the home which the doctor had in readiness, where he is receiving that careful attention and nursing which the fever patient most needs to bring him back to health and strength.
