THE DALLES CARNIVAL.

The street fair and carnival at The Dalles will open next Tuesday and continue through the week. The occasion promises to be an interesting one, and no doubt many Gilliam county people will attend. We would suggest that some one who has the time to do so should prepare an exhibit of Gilliam county products for display at the fair, or if it is too late to do so, let each one who attends take with them a sample of some of our big products. Our county excels in grain, fruit and many things and it is time we begin to let the world know what we can produce. Take some big products to The Dalles and show our neighbors that Gilliam county is it.

The American Type Founders Company of Portland is under contract with the Republican National Committee to furnish campaign supplements to all republican editors who are not sufficiently hooked up mentally to write their own campaign copy. The A. T. F. Co. gets the bundle and the editors get to pay extra expressage and postage on the supplements and also get to circulate a lot of irresponsible stuff, for which they alone will be held responsible if the question of responsibility should ever arise. It is a healthy sign of the times, however, to note that at a recent meeting of the republican editorial association held at Portland that the brainy element of that class of newspaper men in this state decided to have nothing to do with this latest scheme to use the country editor for a cat's-paw to pull from the fire the fine fat chestnuts for the benefit of the type trust and the national committee. Since that meeting, which was held some two weeks ago, we notice that the number of supplement laden sheets coming to our exchange table has grown less wonderfully fast. The only class of papers which still cling to the supplements is that class whose editors do not possess sufficient brains to edit a paper themselves and whose only ambition is to grind out a sheet which will hold a little dab of land office patronage, upon which depends their hope of three square meals a day.

Those republican organs who are working themselves into a frenzy over the rotten egg reception which was accorded "Teddy the terror" in Colorado the other night should pause long enough to remember that a similar reception was tendered Mr. Bryan at one of the classic college towns in New England in 1896 by an hundred or so hoodlum scions of America's wealthiest families. These same organs did not snarl at the mouth a bit on that occasion, but rather excused the overt act as a boyish prank to be smiled at and condoned. These same organs, as well as Mr. Roosevelt himself, should also remember that the little gang of Colorado ruffians were only putting in practice Teddy's teachings as to the "strenuous life." The press dispatches reported Roosevelt as saying in a public speech in 1896 that in case of Bryan's election he would head an armed force and march to Washington to see that the Nebraska did not take his seat as president. Many people will believe that such a statement, if made as reported, was more treasonable than the act of chucking a few spoiled eggs and lemons at a fellow citizen or even striking a big brawny bear fighter on the breast with a ten cent flag. All such actions and expressions are

reprehensible, but the pity is that all respectable newspapers do not treat them as they should be treated without regard to politics.

The Fossil Journal proceeds to criticize Gilliam county courts and juries in regard to the disposition of criminal cases in a manner which might lead uninformed people to believe that the ends of justice were not subserved in this county. With all due deference to Mr. Stewart's mental acumen and insight into public affairs, however, we beg to submit that there are still whole fields full of people at large who will believe that a jury composed of twelve intelligent conscientious citizens are as capable of rendering a verdict in a criminal case, of which they heard all the evidence, as is Mr. Stewart, who heard none of it. Some men who are "to the manor born" give general satisfaction as judges and jurors, while others who import themselves and set up as public elucidators on questions relating to law and politics often fall short of the mark.

Goldendale is reported as having a new paper, making the third in that village. The place undoubtedly had as much need of another paper as a dog has for two tails, but it is evidently another case of some would-be politicians imagining they have a grievance and wanting to "do up" some neighbor. Referring to the new paper the old reliable Sentinel says: "We offered to publish a paper for them during the campaign for \$300.00. They will learn that this was a fair proposition, but they preferred to go in debt \$600 for a \$1,000 plant. The people have no sympathy with those who squander their money in unprofitable business."

Mark Hanna's statement that there is no trusts is likely to upset the trust that many voters have been placing in Mr. Hanna.
