Ex-Sheriff Sanderson Back.

Arlington Independent. Ed Sanderson, a former and well known old settler of Gilliam county, arrived in Arlington Tuesday, direct from Cape Nome, where he has been since last July. He came down on the steamer South Portland. Mr. Sanderson said he did lots of prospecting and mining but aside from the experience of the trip got very little pay for it. "I do not mean to say that the trip did not pay me; for I feel well paid in experience. There is little chance for a man to do much there now. Everything is taken and there is no chance for a man to even stake out a claim, and chances for a man to go there and do anything in business are very slim. But I expect I shall return," continued Mr. Sanderson. "But a man has chances there that he don't have here, but I'll tell you, he pays for all that he gets, too. I met Harve Condon up there. He took sheep up which he sold for \$20 per head and then lost money on them. It cost him \$10 a head to pay the freight on them. Harve and I prospected together. It has been ten years since I left this county. I was the first and only republican sheriff of Gilliam county. Wilcox defeated me for sheriff ten years ago." Mr. Sanderson says that every kind of machinery imaginable is to be seen in the Cape Nome country. Hundreds of abandoned ideas in machinery are to be seen in that country, and many are strewn along the beach covered with sand. His home is now in Gilroy, Cal. He will remain here a few days before returning to his home in California.
