LOCAL NEWS.

Judge Mattingly is in town today. Mrs W. R. Neal is somewhat improved. Mike Summers was in town Monday. Dr. Gullette's condition remains about the same. A. D. Halsey was in town from Mayville precinct Friday. C. W. Grosfield went to The Dalles Monday on a business trip. Miss Ebb, of Arlington, was the guest of Miss Beryl Springton over Sunday. Boss—Saturday, November 10, 1900, to Mr. and Mrs. Lon Downing, a son. C. S. Palmer is preparing to drill a well on his residence property on north Main street. Miss Pearl Shelton, of Arlington, went through on Saturday's stage to visit friends at Mayville. County court was in session last week, with Judge Mariner and Commissioners Dyer and Boyer in attendance. Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Moore have recently moved into their new residence, lately built on their ranch near town. Pat Connolly was in town for a few days last week enjoying a layoff after a long summer campaign in the mountains. H. C. Bryson came in from Weston Saturday evening, having driven over by train. Mrs. Bryson will return home with him. Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Bour have moved to town for the winter. They are occupying one of the Barker houses near the school house. Will Hartman, who has been seriously ill for several weeks, was moved to his father's residence on Monday. His condition continues about the same. Mrs. Carter, of Arlington, came out Saturday and is at present stopping with her sister, Mrs. W. B. Neal. She may decide to locate here permanently. C. J. Quinn was in from Mayville last Friday on business before the county court connected with the estate of H. Beck, deceased, of which he is executor. Frank Stevens was in from Thirty-mile again Thursday. Wonder if Frank will ever forget about that election and quit coming to town to "josh" us fellows? Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Musgrove brought their baby to town Monday for medical treatment. The child was better yesterday and they expect to return home today. Harry Ladd, of Clem, was in town Saturday. Mr. Ladd has accepted a position with the Pacific Coast Wire Trust Co., of Portland, and will leave for that place in a few days to enter upon his duties. A donation of 100 bushels of fine apples has just been made to the parsonage committee of the Olex church by A. A. Carothers, the well-known Rock creek fruit grower. The fruit is now on sale at the Crum mill on very reasonable terms. The proceeds will go into the parsonage fund. Proposed Change in Arlington Road. After completing their work in the regular session of the county court last week, Judge Mariner and Commissioners Dyer and Boyer spent a day looking over the route of a proposed change in the county road between this place and Arlington. The members of the court were accompanied on their tour of inspection by a number of citizens and the opinion of all seems to be that the proposed change is a good one. The new route will leave the present road on the ridge about five miles this side of Clem and will follow down a draw to Rock creek. At Olex a new grade will be made up the hill, starting at Randall's place and coming out at the head of the present lane on Shuttler Flat. It is claimed the new route will save two miles of distance between here and Olex, and that the new grade will not exceed 10 inches to the rod. We are informed that all the members of the county court favor the change if the right of way can be secured, and if the proper arrangements can be made, work will commence within a few days. Ione Road. E. G. Sperry, Tom Stubblefield, J. A. Woolery and Mat Holverson, well known citizens of Ione, were here Saturday night, having come across country from their town to Condon to look over the route of a proposed wagon road between the two places. Wm. Cooke and two or three other wheat raisers of this neighborhood came back with them, having gone over the route Friday on the same errand. While in town the Ione party called at the Globe office and reported that they believe the route to be a feasible one, the distance between the two points being about 30 miles, and they believe a grade may be built up the hill on the east side of Rock creek which will not exceed eight inches to the rod. They stated that it is their intention to have a survey made at once and if their expectations as to the grade are realized they will make an effort to have the road built. Gilliam and Morrow counties will probably be asked for some help and a subscription paper will be circulated to make up the necessary amount. Mr. Sperry stated that, in his opinion, the grade will cost about \$1000. The proposed route will cross Rock creek at the old Downer place.
