A NEWSPAPER BIGOT.

Commenting on the recent removal of Professor Ross from his position as head of the department of sociology in the Stanford University the Oregonian says: "It is to Mrs. Stanford's credit that one of the redoubtable cranks and quacks that have from time to time broken into the faculty of her great university has at length been gotten rid of."

"Crank," "quack," etc., are the only expressions in the Oregonian's vocabulary by which that paper can describe the man who dares to hold and to express an opinion not in strict accord with the views of certain subservient tools of corporate wealth.

According to Professor Ross' own statement, he lost his position by reason of two lectures recently delivered. In one of these he spoke against Coolie immigration, and pointed out the danger to American labor and the American standard of living which a large influx of the lower classes of Orientals would bring about, while in the other address he spoke in favor of the municipal ownership of city water and light plants, street railways, etc.

The Oregonian denies free speech or even independent thought to any man who disagrees with it. The college professor who teaches the beauties of the gold standard, the glories of free trade or the later theory that corporate monopoly is, and by right ought to be the master of everybody and everything politically, socially and educationally, is all right—from the Oregonian's standpoint—but let him deviate a hair's breadth from that line in his teachings on any of these propositions the Oregonian hastens to the top of its tall tower and denounces him as a "crank," a "quack," an "anarchist," a "dangerous agitator," etc., etc.

The Oregonian is a bigot; it is self righteous; it arrogates to itself all the virtue and wisdom and concedes nothing to those who differ with it.

After the news of the late republican land-slide got in last week and the democrats had time to catch their breath and collect their thoughts they began to talk about putting in a "straight" democrat

paper in Condon, "begod." The scheme fell through, however, for three reasons: First, there was no democrat ring. Second, the democrats were not mad enough to get good action on themselves, and third, they had no Wheeler county magnate on the string to put up money for them. So Condon will have to struggle along with one newspaper, as in the past, with a Wheeler county annex on the side.

The State Treasurer, Hon. C. S. Moore, says that only six counties have, so far, paid in any scalp bounty tax. Why do not our officials compel those counties to levy and pay their taxes according to the law enacted at the last session of the Legislature, that refuse to do so? It is their plain duty. If our laws cannot be enforced it is worse than useless to expend large sums to have them passed. Let the matter be brought up in the Courts at once, which should have been done when Multnomah county first refused to levy that tax, and if found to be unconstitutional as claimed, the law will then be declared void, and the people will know what they can expect, and stop expending their time and money for nothing, and remember, it is the poor man's loss and the broker's benefit.—Antelope Republican.

There are more ways than one of paying campaign debts. A Chicago dispatch says the Government has given the firm of Armour & Co., the head of the great beef trust, the contract of printing internal revenue stamps on checks and sleeping car and parlor car tickets, at a price from five to 10 times the amount that would be charged by a printer on a competitive bid. The clear profit is said to be about \$1000 per month, which for 48 months is not a bad graft. But then the Armour's are poor folk, who need a little lift, so nobody should complain.—Telegram.
