One of the most successful affairs of the kind ever given in Condon was the Christmas tree and entertainment at the Latter Day Saints church Monday evening. A large crowd was in attendance, every inch of floor space being occupied, and the announcement "standing room only" would have been appropriate sometime before the entertainment commenced. Elder Harris called a few well chosen remarks which were particularly appropriate for the occasion. An excellent program of vocal and instrumental music, recitations, dialogues, etc., was then rendered in a particularly clever manner, reflecting much credit on the young people who took part. Space forbids a separate mention of the individual performers, but it is only right to say that all acquitted themselves nobly. After the program, which was cut short on account of the crowded condition of the building, Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus made their appearance and began the distribution of Christmas goods in wholesale quantities. Every child—and most of the older people—was remembered, and every little heart went plitty-pat as the gifts and goodies were passed around. The occasion was certainly a successful one. But the Latter Day Saints will have to hire the largest hall in town for the next Christmas entertainment they have, if they wish to accommodate the people.

## Christmas at Ferry Canyon.

A Christmas tree was given at the Nelson school house in Ferry Canyon Monday evening, which was a grand success in every sense of the word. A fund of about \$20.00 was raised in the neighborhood to provide sweetmeats and good things for general distribution, and in addition to this the tree was loaded down with private gifts and mementos of the Yule-tide season. An excellent program of musical and literary selections was rendered by the young people of the neighborhood, after which Santa appeared and slung presents and good things in every direction. At midnight a splendid supper was served, after which a social dance was enjoyed, the proceeds going to the purchase of new desks for the school. This was the first Christmas entertainment ever given in the district, and much credit is due Prof. H. A. Scoggin, the popular teacher, who took the initiative in making and carrying out the arrangements.

## For an Open River.

A recent dispatch from Washington to the Spokane-Review says:

The secretary of war has transmitted to the house the report of the chief of engineers upon the examination and survey of the Columbia river between the foot of The Dalles rapids and the head of Celilo Falls, Ore. and Washington, with a view to the construction of a canal and a lock to overcome the obstructions to navigation, authorized by the last river and harbor act.

The estimated cost of the work is given as \$3,369,371, or in round numbers \$4,000,000. Captain Hart, who made the survey, reports that the work is one of public importance worthy of undertaking for the United States, but in connection with the advisability of beginning the undertaking at this time he calls attention to the reports in favor of a postage road around the obstructions, which could be completed at one-tenth the cost of a canal and in half the time. He says that such a road would determine the future commerce and indicate the capacity of the permanent improvement required.

But if there is objection to the ownership of such road by the United States he recommends the early improvement by means of canals. The chief of engineers makes no specific recommendation.
