National Livestock Convention

A large representation from Oregon will be drawn to Salt Lake City to attend the meeting of the National Livestock Association there January 15. George Young, of Shaniko, and J. D. McCulloch, of Joseph, have been appointed by the Governor to represent the state at the convention. The State Livestock Association has elected Richard Scott, E. L. Looney, Charles Cleveland, W. O. Minor and Frank Brown to represent it at the meeting. The Oregon Agricultural College will appear before the convention with fine photographic views of blooded Oregon stock, which will serve as illustrations for lectures. In addition to these a large number of stock breeders will attend. The convention will review questions of vital importance to the stockmen of Oregon, which accounts for the unusual interest taken by the people of this state in the meeting. Among the most important subjects for consideration will be the following:

- Resolution favoring Government instead of state inspection of livestock. Resolution against the passage of the Groat bill. Report of special committee on amendment of the land laws. The use of forest reservations for grazing purposes. The census of livestock and methods to secure annual vital statistics in relation to livestock industry. Irrigation and its relation to the grazing of arid lands in the West. Methods of securing more universal laws regarding livestock in the various states and territories. Our export trade and methods of building up the same. Transportation of livestock by railroads and matters appertaining thereto. Work of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States and methods for aiding the bureau to extend its work in the interest of the industry.—Telegram.

ENTHUSIASTIC

Was the Railroad Meeting. Big Crowd Present and All Interested.

Purely to a call published in the last two issues of the GLOBE a large and enthusiastic meeting was held in Armory hall last Saturday afternoon for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of constructing a railroad between Condon and the Columbia river. More than 100 representative citizens of the county were present, almost every locality in the county being represented, and the unanimous sense of the meeting was that a railroad can and should be built by the people of this county. The subject was pretty thoroughly discussed by a number of speakers, the keynote of each address being in effect "We need a railroad. We must have a railroad, and we can and will build a railroad."

Mayor Dunn called the meeting to order, and on motion W. S. Myers was elected chairman of the meeting, and S. A. Pattison secretary. The chairman made a few remarks stating the object of the meeting and called on B. T. Snell of Olex for a speech. Mr. Snell has taken much interest in the local transportation problem for several years and has taken some trouble to secure information in relation to the subject. His remarks were listened to with much interest. He believes that with proper organization the people of this county can readily build, own and operate a railroad, and favors a narrow gauge road, for the reason that the cost of construction and equipment will be very materially less than would be a standard gauge line. Mr. Snell was followed by S. B. Barker, Ed Dunn, R. B. Lucas, L. J. Johnson, W. J. Edwards, B. K. Searcy and other speakers, all of whom were in accord on the main proposition, viz, for a railroad, to be built, owned and operated by the people of Gilliam county.

Some of the speakers advocated a narrow gauge line, others a standard gauge, and one speaker was of the opinion that an electric motor line would prove to be the best and the cheapest. Mr. Searcy and other speakers who advocated a standard gauge road based their objections to the narrow gauge on the cost of transferring freight at the junction of the O. R. & N. During the course of the discussion of the whole matter the interesting fact was brought out that the crop of 1900 in the territory contiguous to the proposed road, and which will be handled by it in the event of its construction, aggregates in round numbers 1,000,000 bushels, and the cost of transporting the same to Arlington by wagon amounts to the somewhat startling sum of \$85,000. The figures on the amount of wheat grown were secured from the different threshermen of the county, and the cost of hauling is based on 12 cts. per bushel for all wheat grown south of the Hay creek butte, and 5 cents per bushel for all grown north of that point.

After considerable discussion of the question at issue a committee of five was appointed to report an order of business for the meeting, the committee consisting of B. T. Snell, Ed Dunn, W. J. Edwards, R. B. Lucas and L. J. Johnson. The report submitted follows: Your committee begs leave to report the following order of business for this meeting:

- Resolved, That this meeting form a joint stock company, to be called the _____ Railroad Company, with a capital stock of \$500,000. We further recommend that this meeting elect a committee of seven or more representative men on permanent organization and incorporation.

The report being adopted, the following gentlemen were elected as members of the committee: S. B. Barker, Ed Dunn, Condon; B. T. Snell, H. D. Randall, Olex; Fred Tobey, W. L. Barker, Arlington; John Shorb, Ralph Froman, Ferry Canyon; A. Greiner, W. J. Edwards, Mayville; G. Schilling, H. L. Propst, Matney; A. B. Lamb, Will Hoover, Fossil; C. A. Danneeman, W. R. Boyer, Clem; R. M. Johnson, Lone Rock. This committee is called to meet at Condon on tomorrow (Friday) at 2 o'clock P. M. to formulate a report, which will be submitted to a mass meeting to be held at 10 o'clock A. M. on the following day. After some further discussion an adjournment was taken until Saturday, January 12, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The meeting was a notable one on account of the lively interest manifested by every one present. The people are in earnest in this matter and the consensus of opinion among all present seemed to be that the outlook is more than favorable for carrying the project to a successful termination. It is believed that the next meeting will be more largely attended than the last one, and it is hoped by all who have the interests of grand old Gilliam at heart that those who doubted that a successful meeting could be held, and who still doubt that a railroad can be built, will be as wide of the mark in one instance as in the other.
