On account of continued sickness in the family of Prof. Neal the observance of John Marshall Day in the public school has been abandoned. Prof. Neal had commenced arrangements for the day, but for the reason above stated it was found inexpedient to carry them out.

An effort is being made to establish a post office at Ferry Canyon which is likely to be successful. Al McConnell, of Mayville, expects to establish a store at Geo. ## VICTORIA DEAD.

England's Queen Passes Away at a Ripe Old Age.

Victoria Alexandrina, Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and Empress of India, died at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, Tuesday evening, January 22, 1901, aged about 82 years, Albert Prince of Wales is hailed as king.

Victoria was born May 24, 1819, at Kensington Palace and was the only child of the Duke of Kent and of Princess Louise Victoria of Saxe-Coburg. She succeeded her uncle, William IV, to the throne June 20, 1837. She was married February 10, 1840, to Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, to whom she bore nine children. She was loved and revered by her subjects as a true woman and a just sovereign.

## Canal and Locks at Celilo.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Senator Simon today offered an amendment to the river and harbor bill, striking out the clause repealing the boat railway project and substituting therefor the new project of Captain Harts for a canal and locks.

His amendment diverts the \$220,000 now remaining to the new project; provides for the immediate commencement of work by contract or otherwise, and limits the cost at \$3,969,371.

## THE PORTAGE ROAD.

The Dalles Will Ask for Legislative Appropriation.

A press dispatch from The Dalles, under date of January 11, is as follows: Considerable discussion is going on relative to asking the coming session of the legislature to make an appropriation for the purpose of constructing a portage railroad around the dalles of the Columbia, which are situated about three miles east of that city, and extend to Celilo, being a distance of about eight miles. An examination of the roadbed has just been made, and it is ascertained that of the eight miles of necessary roadbed, five miles will be dirt and the remaining three miles basalt rock.

Several years ago the federal government purchased a right of way on the south bank of the Columbia river at this point for the purpose of constructing a boat railway, but this scheme has been abandoned, and the government still retains the right of way, and it is proposed now that this right of way be permitted to be used by Oregon upon which to construct and operate the proposed portage road.

It is estimated by several parties who have recently looked over the entire route that the dirt roadbed would cost about \$4000 per mile, and the rock about \$12,000 per mile, and that the construction of the whole road would not exceed \$100,000. Boats could safely go up the river to the portage road, and a suitable harbor in an eddy could be made at a cost of \$8000, which the federal government would doubtless do.

An appropriation of \$150,000 will be asked for, which amount would construct and completely equip the road with rolling stock, etc.

It is estimated by Captain Hart, United States engineer, that the country tributary to this proposed road produces 24,000,000 bushels of wheat alone, without considering the other diverse products that the country does and can produce. It is argued that the entire cost of this road could be saved in freight rates alone on wheat, without considering the vast amount of the money saved on other produce and the shipment of supplies to the upper country from Portland.

Mr. McMorris is also working on a city circuit, which he proposes to connect by switchboard with all of the surrounding country lines. His proposition is to put in city 'phones at \$12.00 per year rental, with a charge of 5 cents for switching to any of the country lines.
