Ex-President Dying.

General Benjamin Harrison, Ex-President of the United States, who has been very ill for a week with la grippe and pneumonia, was reported at the point of death Tuesday evening, and it was then believed his death was a question of but a few hours.

General Harrison was born at North Bend, Ohio, in 1833. He served with distinction in the civil war and was promoted to be a Brigadier-General. He was elected to the United States senate in 1880, and in 1888 was elected to the presidency.

Her illness was of several months' duration, and only a few weeks ago she came to this city to visit her brother with the hope that perhaps the change would prove beneficial; but in spite of all that loving hands could do in her behalf her young soul was called from earthly scenes to that unknown home which lies beyond the sunset of life. She leaves a father, mother, four brothers, one sister and a host of friends to mourn her untimely end.

The funeral occurred on Sunday, the services being conducted in the Congregational church by Rev. J. M. Lawson of Fossil. Interment in Mount Moriah cemetery.

Plenty of Water.

Rev. Edward Curran returned from Ione Monday. Mr. Curran came via Rott, Spencer's ranch, on the east side of Rock creek, and informs us that Mr. Spencer has at last succeeded in striking a beautiful supply of excellent water on his ranch. The first well which he had drilled was sunk to a depth of 183 feet, but the supply of water not proving sufficient, another attempt was made farther down the slope, and at a depth of 45 feet a vein of water was struck which furnishes between 2000 and 3000 gallons a day. The water is pumped by a windmill and forced to a tank at the house, a distance of about 2000 feet. Mr. Schanney owns the drilling machine, and his next well will be on Leroy Paul's ranch.
