He will receive the cattle purchased May 20. The price paid is \$18 for top yearlings and \$15 for shorts.

Dr. Wood visited the patient yesterday morning and pronounced the case to be smallpox beyond a doubt.

Grand Master Here.
James Welsh Esq., of Astoria, Grand Master of the Oregon Jurisdiction I. O. O. F., visited Summit lodge No. 130, and Minnehaha lodge No. 109 (Rebekah) officially last Saturday evening. A good number of members were present and a profitable meeting was enjoyed.

In his visitations to the different lodges the grand master urges on members everywhere in the jurisdiction to be alive to the importance of promoting the grand principles of the order and to the necessity of cultivating the qualities of fraternity and brotherly love within the order.

Mr. Welsh has visited more lodges in the state than has any of his predecessors and as he is an enthusiastic Odd Fellow and an agreeable gentleman, his visits are sure to prove of great benefit to the order.

The Odd Fellows is now the strongest fraternal organization in the United States. The first lodge was instituted in Baltimore, April 26, 1819, with five members. Today there are 66 grand lodges, 53 grand encampments, with 900,000 subordinate lodge members, 350,000 Rebekah lodge members, 135,000 encampment members or a total of 1,485,000 individuals who are enlisted under the banner of Odd Fellowship. During the past year a disbursement, for practical relief, of \$3, 756,337.66 was made and during the 82 years that the order has been in existence the stupendous sum of \$85,000,000 has been distributed for the relief of the sick and the afflicted, the widow and the orphan.
