THE COUNTY SURVEYOR.

If we interpret the matter aright, the last legislature passed an act which transforms the county surveyor's office from a position offering little employment and meager remuneration, to one affording affluence, influence and plenty to do. Under this law the county surveyor is entitled to an office in the county court house. He shall fit this office up as he becomes his position, and procure the materials and requisites—instruments, etc.—for carrying into effect the provisions of this act "and the county shall pay for the same and all expenses incurred therein out of the general fund of the county," and no question asked. He shall receive fees for his services the sum of \$5 per day for each and every day employed in the performance of his duties, and ten cents per mile for each mile actually traveled in going from the county seat to and from the place of survey.

The duties enumerated in the act will increase materially the number of days, employment now enjoyed by the surveyor. He is authorized to administer oaths necessary to the legal establishment of roads and other surveys and to take evidence to prove any point necessary to such survey.

Upon the establishment of any road he shall enter the plat and field notes upon the official records of the county. He shall make out a complete description of all or any part of the real estate of his county, to be made out and entered on proper rolls furnished by the clerk. He shall make complete surveys, plans, specifications and estimates for all bridges, culverts, roads, ditches or other public works to be constructed under the authority of the county court. The court may employ a civil engineer or architect to act in conjunction with the surveyor.

For taking the variation of the magnetic needle, and recording and making report of the same, for making and recording calculations of areas of land, for attendance at regular meetings of the county court when required for making plans, specifications, superintending or inspecting public work, the surveyor shall receive the same fees as allowed for making surveys, which fees shall be paid bi-monthly upon order of the court.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
