Archbishop Christie, of Portland, vis-ited the Catholic churches at this place and Mayville during the week and con-ducted confirmation services. Not a Condon Girl.

Considerable notoriety has been attached to certain saffron hued stories sent out from Oregon City and published in the Oregonian in regard to a man and a girl, the latter in male attire, who are under arrest at that place. It was at first al-leged that the couple hailed from Condon and a big story of abduction was printed with all the usual details.

It now appears that, so far as Condon, or Condon people being in any connected with the affair is concerned, the story is a fake. The following appeared in the Oregonian of last Friday:

OREGON CITY, May 2.—The girl in the city jail, who continued to insist that her name was Cora Fletcher, until a late hour today, was forced to admit to-night that she was Maggie Dunn, from near LaCamas, Wash. A young man named Davis, an employe at the paper mills, identified the girl, and the man arrested with her as Wolf. Davis had known them both near LaCamas, hav-ing worked with Wolf in a logging camp. Wolf, it is said, left a wife and five chil-dren to run off with a 16-year-old girl.
