## Of Interest to Teachers.

It will be of interest to teachers to know that after the 22nd, of the present month all persons holding state papers or first grade certificates from other counties, will be required to pay a fee of \$1.00 for having the same filed in the office of county school superintendent. Prior to that date such papers will be filed in that office without cost to the holder.

No certificate is valid until the same is filed with the superintendent of the county in which the holder desires to teach. Section 8 of Title VI, Oregon School Law, reads as follows: "If any district school board shall draw a warrant on the school fund for the wages of any teacher who does not hold a valid permit, certificate or diploma and lay the same before the board for inspection, such district shall forfeit its proportion of the school fund for the current year."

## Demand for Normal Graduates.

The State Normal School at Monmouth reports that the demand for its graduates during the past year has been much beyond the supply. Graduation practically assures a place worth from \$40 to \$75 per month. The students take the State examination during the regular course, and are easily able to pass on all subjects required for state papers before graduation. The school has a well equipped Training Department consisting of a nine grade town school and of a typical country school.
