The Wheeler County Pioneer's meeting which was held at Richmond last week was a great success.

L. R. and L. T. Price are holding a fine large residence for A. D. Hardie at his ranch on Trail Fork.

County Commissioner W. R. Boyer left last week for Buffalo, New York to visit the Pan-American Exposition.

A large amount of freight is going through from Arlington lately. Material for the new Wheeler county court house is now coming.

Geo. Welshon's family, who have been in Arlington all winter, where the children attended school, have returned to their ranch near Clea.

C. A. Danneman and family are expected home from Corvallis this week where his daughter, Miss Carrie recently graduated at the Oregon Agricultural College.

Prof. J. H. Beattie, president of the Eastern Oregon State Normal School will deliver a lecture in this place Monday evening June 24, on an educational subject.

Geo. Gibbons, of Mayville, returned from Arlington Saturday where he went to meet his two daughters Misses Mollie and Agnes, who have been attending the Sister's Academy at The Dalles.

The large colored posters for Condon's Fourth of July celebration recently turned out at the Globe office, do not give nearly all the attractions which will be presented on that day as the program was not fully arranged when the posters were printed.

W. S. Lytle, who was formerly connected with the Columbia Southern railroad has organized a company of Heppner capitalists for the purpose of developing a coal prospect 25 miles from Heppner and building a railroad to the same. The coal is said to be of good quality.

President Stephen Penrose, of Whitman College, Walla Walla, Washington has been notified by Prof. W. R. Neal of the award of the Whitman scholarship to Miss Lilla May Clarke, who won the prize as head of her class in the Condon Public School. President Penrose has in turn notified Miss Clarke that the scholarship is at her disposal.

Mr. Condit, who is one of the best printers on the coast, made final proof on his homestead on that day. C. W. White was in town Thursday, Mr. White has sold 2830 head of two-year-old wethers to Jim Wright, of North Yakima, which will be shipped to market. The sheep were shorn last week by the Seary crew of shearers and, Mr. White says, is the best job of shearing ever done in the country. The band averaged 15 pounds and more and the wool is of extra quality in texture and staple.

Work has commenced on an artesian well on Henry Wilkins place near Clem. The same drill is at work which was successfully used on Robert Spencer's and Leroy Paul's ranches last winter. A hole was recently sunk on the Weatherford ranch on Shuttler Flat but without success. If Mr. Wilkins secures a strong artesian flow he will be well pleased but a good pumping well is not to be sneezed at.

While coming to town Friday evening on horse back, Pat Skelly's horse fell with him throwing Mr. Skelly to the ground with great force. He was badly stunned and bruised but fortunately no bones were broken. Herman Pauling was riding with Mr. Skelly and he and others, who ran up from town rendered him necessary assistance. The accident happened just above C. S. Palmer's residence.

Obituary. Josiah B. Smith died Saturday, evening, June 15, 1901, at his home on Thirymile, near Condon, after a brief illness of about 24 hours. Although he had been ailing for several years he was heard to say a short time before his death that he had been in better health for the last two or three years than for a long time.

Deceased was born in Illinois April 1, 1832 and removed, with the Powell family to the Willamette valley in 1851. Was married to Miss Nancy Maxwell, in Lane county, Oregon, in 1855.

This tribute to the memory of Uncle Joe Smith, as he was familiarly called, would be incomplete without an accompanying word of tribute to the noble woman who survives him. We can only think of them together as in the old days. Mingled with fond recollections of him will always be loving thoughts of her who, for 45 years, has stood faithfully by his side.

To their union was born eight children all of whom are still living.

In 1885, with his family, he removed to Eastern Oregon settling on Beecher Flat, in this county, where he resided until about seven years ago when he moved to the place on Thirymile that has since been his home.

He was respected by all who knew him and it has been truly said of him that he had not an enemy in the world. He was a thorough christian, being a member of the Christian church, and bright, broad hope was the very breath of his nature. It was a constant comfort to him to know that several of his sons were near him in his declining years and it was a comfort to his children to know that more tender filial devotion or a more loving father, was never known.

The children are: Mac, Art, Joe, Lud, and George Smith, of this county, Ed and Frank Smith, of Albany, and Mrs. May, of California. One brother and one sister, who reside in Kansas, also survive him.

The funeral took place at the family residence, Monday, June 17th., and was largely attended the services being conducted by Rev. Curran, of Condon, and Rev. Lawson, of Fossil. Interment in the Mayville cemetery.

Such was "the end of earth" of one beloved by all.

Independence Day Sports. As will be seen by posters, recently printed at this office, the committee on sports have arranged the following excellent program for the afternoon of the Fourth:

Foot race—100 yards, free-for-all—Parade \$10. Entrance fee, \$1, to be added to purse. First and second money.

Ladies' foot race—40 yards—Parade \$3. Sack race—40 yards—Parade \$2.50. Egg race—Parade \$3.50.

Three-legged race—50 yards—Parade \$5. One standing jump—Parade \$2. Base ball game—Parade \$25.

Boy's foot race—14 years and under—Parade \$2. Girl's foot race—14 years and under—Parade \$2.

Pony race—300 yards—14 1/2 hands and under—Parade \$20. Entrance fee \$2, to be added to the purse—First and second money.

Horse race—300 yards, free-for-all—Parade \$50. Entrance fee \$5, to be added to purse—First and second money.

On Friday, July 5th., will occur the big racing event of the season, being a 500 yard horse race, free-for-all, purse \$100. The entrance fee in this race is \$10 to be added to the purse, first and second money being offered.

The following rules will govern all horse races:

1. Five to enter and three to start.

2. Judges have full authority to declare any race off if they are satisfied of any foul, or foul riding.

3. All entries for horse racing on July 4th., to close at 12 o'clock noon, on that day.

4. All entries for the free-for-all horse race, to be run July 5th., to close July 4th., at 9 o'clock P. M.

5. Entrance fees to be paid to Fred Wilson, chairman of committee on Sports.

A horse cart race will also take place on Friday for which a purse of \$25 is offered.

A \$500 outfit of fireworks has been ordered and the pyrotechnic display promises to be the finest ever seen in this section of the State.

A grand ball will take place on the night of the Fourth which will be fully up to the standard of excellence for which such events in Condon are noted.

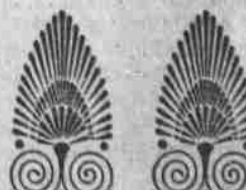
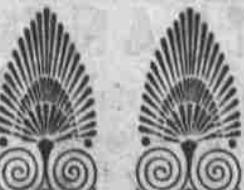
