GLORIOUS FOURTH

Program of the Day. Speeches Music, Sports, Fire-works and Dance.

UJIS FIERCE AND WILD

Everything Goes for the Biggest Day in Condon's History.

The big celebration was ushered in this morning with an April chorus at sunrise which served night on old and young that the great day had at last arrived.

The grand parade will form at the Congregational Church at 10 A. M. and with a flourish of trumpets, and in a blaze of glory will march in triumphal procession through the principal streets of the city to the celebration grounds on Oregon Avenue. S. K. Lona will act as marshal of the day.

At the grounds, the meeting will be called to order by Hon. John F. Pinkham, who will act as president of the day, after which the following program will be rendered:

Music by the band.
Remarks by the chairman.
Prayer—Rev. Edward Curran.
Song—Quartet.
Oration by Hon. A. L. Nesbitt, of Portland.
Song—Quartet.
Recitation—Miss Naomi Stengle.
Music by the band.
Song—"Red White and Blue" by everybody.
Song—"America"—Everybody standing.
Benediction—Rev. Edward Curran.

After dinner, the fierce and terrible Ujji tribe will put in an appearance, wear paint feathers and all, and all stupid people would better climb a tree or hide in a cellar. Their reign will be short, however, and as soon as they are safely in the lockup the following program of sports will be pulled off:

Foot race—100 yards, free-for-all—Purse \$10. Entrance fee, \$1, to be added to purse. First and second money.
Ladies' foot race—40 yards—Purse \$5.
Sack race—40 yards—Purse \$2.50.
Egg race—Purse \$3.50.
Three-legged race—50 yards—Purse \$5.
One standing jump—Purse \$2.
Base ball game—Purse \$25.
Boy's foot race—14 years and under—Purse \$2.
Girl's foot race—14 years and under—Purse \$2.
Pony race—300 yards—14 1/2 hands and under—Purse \$20. Entrance fee \$2, to be added to the purse—First and second money.
Horse race—300 yards, free-for-all—Purse \$50. Entrance fee \$5, to be added to purse—First and second money.

On Friday, July 5th, will occur the big racing event of the season, being a 500 yard horse race, free-for-all, purse \$100. The entrance fee in this race is \$10 to be added to the purse, first and second money being offered.
The following rules will govern all horse races:
1 Five to enter and three to start.
2 Judges have full authority to disqualify any race off if they are satisfied of any foul, or foul riding.
3 All entries for horse racing on July 4th, to close at 12 o'clock noon, on that day.
4 All entries for the free-for-all horse race, to be run July 5th, to close July 4th, at 9 o'clock P. M.
5 Entrance fees to be paid to Fred Wilson, chairman of committee on Sports.
A horse cart race will also take place on Friday for which a purse of \$25 is offered.
A \$800 outfit of fireworks has been ordered and the pyrotechnic display promises to be the finest ever seen in this section of the State.
A grand ball will take place on the night of the Fourth, which will be fully up to the standard of excellence for which such events in Condon are noted.

Mr. C. H. Ries, one of the Rock Creek fruit men, has some of the largest cherries in the country. He will send a sample of them back to the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo, to try for the prize and also to show the people of the East the kind of fruit raised in Eastern Oregon.
